REVIEW OF PUBLIC ART ACTION PLAN

This report is being submitted to the Scrutiny Committee for prior consideration and comment before decision by the Executive Councillor.

1 DECISION TO BE MADE

1.1 To agree the revised Action Plan and the priorities for funding Public Art projects

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

The Scrutiny Committee is asked to consider the recommendations below. The Executive Councillor is asked to approve the recommendations below.

- 2.1 That the revised Public Art Action Plan be approved
- 2.2 That the list of projects for funding from the 'Public Art Initiatives Fund' be approved with the final decision for the approval for individual projects being the responsibility of the Executive Councillor (Planning &Transport)
- 2.3 That the Public Art Plan and the list of projects for funding from the 'Public Art Initiatives Fund' be reviewed again by the Environment Scrutiny Committee in January 2006.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The Public Art Plan is a key component of the Council's overall Arts Plan for Cambridge that was approved in March 2002.
- 3.2 The meeting of the Environment Scrutiny Committee in July 2002 considered the Public Art Plan and the associated Action Plan. The Executive Councillor subsequently approved the Action Plan with a request that it be reviewed after a year. The Supplementary Planning Guidance 'The Provision of Public Art as Part of New Development Schemes' was adopted at the same meeting.
- 3.3 In April 2003 the Council was awarded Beacon Council Status for the theme 'Quality in the Built Environment'. The Council's approach to public art has been

included within the various events and publicity and has attracted considerable interest.

3.4 The first review of the Public Art Action Plan was considered by this Committee in November 2003. The Executive Councillor subsequently approved the revised Action Plan along with the list of projects for funding from the 'Public Art Initiatives Fund', and agreed that both be reviewed in November 2004. This second review of the Public Art Action Plan is attached as Appendix A and details the progress on each of the action points.

4. KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

4.1 The past year's Action Plan progress is summarised below:

Implementation of Supplementary Planning Guidance

- 4.2 The SPG, adopted in July 2002, requires developments to provide public art to the value of one percent of construction costs, either directly or through commuted sums. An illustrated leaflet of the SPG was prepared for issue to developers. The SPG has attracted nationwide interest and is now featured on a number of websites. The SPG has helped planning officers negotiate a far greater number of agreements for public art contributions on planning applications than previously.
- 4.3

 Advice from the Public Art Steering Group (paragraph 4.6) and the Conservation and Design Panel is available to help planning officers in their assessment of public art schemes proposed.

Public Art negotiated

- 4.4 Between November 2003 and 2004 planning officers have negotiated and secured planning agreements for public art contributions for 29 applications. Of these, no direct provision of public art has materialised to date and only one has paid commuted sums. However, a number of public art scheme proposals have been received, are awaiting approval or are due to be submitted soon. There is insufficient information, with regard to construction costs and likely implementation of developments, to provide an estimated total value of projected public art at this time. See paragraph 5.2 for information on commuted sums.
- 4.5 Details of planning agreement negotiations since 2001 and any progress in terms of implementation are shown in Appendix C.

Public Art Steering Group

4.6 The Public Art Steering Group, which meets twice a year, has brought together a wide range of people who are now able to share their experiences and contribute to the development and implementation of the Action Plan. The Group is also instrumental in supporting officers and members in assessing priorities for action and spending, and in supporting and advising Development Control officers in their assessment of public art as part of development proposals. The current membership of the Steering Group is listed in Appendix B. (Those marked with an asterisk have agreed to be advisors to Development Control officers).

Public Art Audit

4.7 A draft audit of public art in the City has been compiled in consultation with the Steering group. Final editing is underway and the audit is due for completion in the spring of 2005. It is planned to publish the audit as a leaflet which will be available also on the Council website.

5 'PUBLIC ART INITIATIVES FUND'

- 5.1 Although officers seek to ensure that public art is included as an integral part of developments there are occasions where this is not possible. When a developer is not able or prepared to include public art within their development, the Council will accept commuted sums to the value of 1% of construction costs. These are sometimes earmarked for specific works related to the planning application sites. However, those sums not allocated to specific sites can be assigned to the Public Art Initiatives Fund to be spent on suitable projects within the City of Cambridge.
- 5.2 As detailed in Appendix C, the current balance of the Public Art Initiative Fund (i.e. money not allocated to specific projects at this time) is only £8,292. The previous review (to Environment Scrutiny Committee) of 11.11.2003 incorrectly states (in Appendix C) that £22,000 was secured for public art in Fitzroy/Burleigh Streets (application ref C/02/0574/FP). However, this money was granted for environmental improvements and not specifically public art. As such, it has been removed from the table in Appendix C.
- 5.3 In line with their agreed Terms of Reference, the Steering Group has considered a range of public art initiatives and has put forward a list of proposals for funding should monies come forward. This list can be found in Appendix D.
- 5.4 It is recommended that the detailed approval for funding of individual projects will be the responsibility of the Executive Councillor (Planning & Transport) following consideration by the Public Art Steering Group. This list will be reviewed annually by the Steering Group and reported to this Scrutiny Committee.

6 NEXT STEPS

Programme for Cambridge Public Art

- In line with the Public Art Steering Group's terms of reference, a programme is being prepared which will identify and prioritise opportunities for public art throughout Cambridge. This will steer future funding allocations from the Public Art Initiatives Fund in a more proactive way as opposed to waiting for artists to come forward with ad-hoc bids for the money. This should also ensure that the needs and opportunities of all areas within the city boundary are considered. This is deemed an essential component in the implementation of the Public Art Action Plan (Appendix A tasks 4 and 23 specifically).
- One element of this programme may include projects which involve artists in the process of masterplanning, designing and constructing of developments, as opposed to simply creating a stand-alone piece of art. There may be scope for a project or projects of this nature within the proposed Cambridge areas of major growth. This concept is currently being explored at Arbury Camp in South

Cambridgeshire through a project initiated by Shape Cambridge and Commissions East. The project, called "Shared Vision", has been successful in obtaining a "PROJECT" award run by Arts & Business and the Commission for the Built Environment (CABE).

6.3 Criteria for assessing public art proposals

- A draft set of criteria will be prepared in consultation with the Public Art Steering Group. This will enable a more robust, consistent and transparent decision-making process. The criteria will be used to: assess public art schemes submitted as part of development proposals;
- prioritise suggestions;
- evaluate bids for funding, and;
- inform the preparation of the programme detailed in 6.1.

The criteria will also been written with a view to encouraging the involvement of artists in small-scale capital projects for neighbourhood settings as set out in task 22 of the Action Plan (Appendix A).

7 CONSULTATIONS

7.1 The Public Art Steering Group has considered this draft report and Action Plan at a special meeting held on 13 January 2005, and their comments have been included within the final version.

8 REASONS FOR DECISION

- 8.1 There is clearly a great deal of interest in the Council's approach to public art with a number of requests for information being made about the Public Art Plan, the SPG and the Public Art Initiatives Fund.
- 8.2 There is also significant local interest in public art as demonstrated by those prepared to give up time to sit on the Steering Group and to offer advice to officers.
- 8.3 The adopted SPG has also helped to secure S106 agreements for public art as an integral part of new development. These works are now starting to be implemented and there is a substantial amount of new public art to follow as developments are constructed.

9 CONCLUSIONS

9.1 This review of the Public Art Action Plan notes in particular the achievements of planning officers during 2004 in implementing supplementary planning guidance and securing the percent for art through planning agreements. Although most of these agreements have yet to come to fruition (commuted funds received or public art schemes completed), the priority for 2005 must be the preparation of both a programme to steer public art in Cambridge and a set of criteria with which to assess proposals to enable the Council to deal effectively with schemes once they begin to materialise.

10 IMPLICATIONS

(a) Financial Implications

The provision of public art by developers represents a significant investment in public art in the city, much of which would not be provided without the adoption of the SPG.

The organisation of the twice-yearly meeting of the Steering Group brings together a number of interested parties at a minimal additional cost to the Council.

(b) Staffing Implications

There are no direct staffing implications arising from this report. However, it should be noted that since the fixed term contract of the Arts Strategy Officer has not been renewed, the officer time available for progressing the Action Plan and for giving advice to developers on the implementation of the SPG has been diminished. Responsibility for implementing the Public Art Plan resides principally with officers from Development Control and the Urban Design Team.

(c) Equal Opportunities Implications

No direct implications, however, it is the intention that public art is freely and widely accessible and that some of the individual projects are specifically targeted at specific groups, including children and the elderly.

(d) Environmental Implications

The provision of public art in the city adds to the interest, variety and quality of the public realm.

(e) Community Safety Implications

The inclusion of works of art in public places can make them more attractive and encourage people to use them. Public art has been used successfully to deter graffiti and thereby has an impact upon people's perception of a place or area. The Council's adopted Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy seeks to involve young people in diversionary activities to reduce graffiti. The Anti-social Behaviour Graffiti Group and Community Arts have been working together for the past 3 years in order to combat illegal and unsightly tagging while providing a creative outlet for graffiti artists and young people interested in graffiti art.

Maintenance of public art is also an important consideration in assessing proposals. For instance, the ability to withstand vandalism and weathering should be demonstrated. Maintenance management plans are likely to be necessary to accompany public art scheme submissions.
