Licensing Act 2003 - Licensing Sub-Committee: Hearings Procedure

Preliminary Matters

1. **The Chair** will commence the hearing by introducing him/herself, the other two members of the Sub-Committee and the officers present.
2. **The Chair** will ask the applicant(s)/the responsible authorities/the interested parties present, and their representatives (if applicable), to introduce themselves and identify their interest in the proceedings.

Failure of a party to attend the hearing

3. If a party has informed the licensing authority that he/she does not intend to attend or be represented at a hearing, the hearing may proceed in his/her absence.
4. If a party who has not so indicated fails to attend or be represented at a hearing, the Sub-Committee may –
 - (a) where it considers it to be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the hearing to a specified date, or
 - (b) hold the hearing in the party's absence.
5. Where the Sub-Committee holds the hearing in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will consider at the hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.
6. **The Chair** will explain the procedure to be followed at the hearing and will confirm whether the Sub-Committee must reach its decision at the end of the hearing or within 5 working days of the hearing, depending on the application being heard.
7. **The Clerk to the Sub-Committee** will indicate whether any party has requested permission for any other person(s) (other than his/her representative) to appear at the hearing to assist the Sub-Committee in relation to the application, representations or notice of the party making the request. The Sub-Committee will decide whether to grant permission to allow any other person(s) to appear at the hearing on behalf of the party; such permission will not be unreasonably withheld.
8. **The Clerk to the Sub-Committee** will ask whether any party is seeking to introduce any document(s) or other information not previously disclosed to all the other parties to the hearing and the licensing authority. If all the other parties consent, the previously undisclosed document(s) or other information can be produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable).
9. The hearing will take the form of a discussion led by the Chair of the Sub-Committee. Cross-examination will not be permitted unless the Sub-Committee considers that cross-examination is required to consider the representations, application or notice as the case may require.
10. The Sub-Committee will consider any requests to permit cross-examination on

a case-by-case basis. When permission is given to one party, it will also normally be extended to all other parties.

11. The Sub-Committee will decide the equal maximum period of time that each party will have to present their case.

The Hearing

12. *The Licensing Officer will present the report to the Sub-Committee.*

13. Members may ask any relevant questions of the Licensing Officer.

14. *The applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, will present their case first.*

15. The party shall be entitled to:

(a) give further information in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) in response to a specific request by the licensing authority prior to the hearing;

(b) question any other party (if permission has been given by the Sub-Committee);

(c) address the Sub-Committee.

16. If the Police are a party to the hearing, they will present their case. The Police have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) – (c) above.

17. If any other “responsible authority” are a party to the hearing, they will present their case in turn after the Police and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) – (c) above.

18. Any other interested parties will then present their case in turn and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) – (c) above.

19. Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of the/each party or any other person permitted to appear at the hearing in support of the party.

20. **The Chair** will invite the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and any parties making representations, to briefly summarise their points if they wish.

21. **The Chair** will ask the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and all parties making representations, that they are satisfied that they have said all they wish to.

The Decision

22. In considering any representations or notice made by a party, the Sub-Committee may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.

23. In reaching its decision, the Sub-Committee will disregard any information given by a party, or any person who has been permitted to appear at the hearing, which is not relevant to –

(a) the application, representations or notice (as applicable) or in the case of another person, the application, representations or notice of the party

requesting their appearance, and

(b) the promotion of the licensing objectives or, in relation to a hearing to consider a notice given by the Police, the crime prevention objective.

24. The Sub-Committee may consider its decision in private and may move into private session where it considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in that part of the hearing taking place in public. If the Sub-Committee do move into private session then all the parties and their representatives, any other person permitted to appear at the hearing, officers, the public and the press will be asked to leave the room whilst the decision is made.

The Chair will tell those present at the meeting the decision taken by the Sub-Committee and the reasons for the decision.

CONSIDERATION OF AN APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE TO BE GRANTED: SAINSBURY'S, 78-80 MILL ROAD, CAMBRIDGE, CB1 2AS

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 An application under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 for a Premises Licence to be granted in respect of Sainsbury's, 78-80 Mill Road, Cambridge, CB1 2AS has been received from Sainsbury's Supermarkets Limited. The application and plans of the premises are attached to the report as Appendix A. The application was served on Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) on 16th January 2015. A copy of the application was also served on each responsible authority.

1.2 The applicant is seeking a new premises licence for the following:

Supply of Alcohol (Off the Premises)

Mon – Sun (inclusive)

08:00 to 23:00

The applicant amended their application on the 23rd February 2015 to the above hours. The original hours requested in the application form was 07:00 to 23:00.

1.3 The applicant has indicated in section M of the application form (Appendix A) that the following steps will be taken to promote the four licensing objectives:

1. The licence holder will ensure that the premises benefit from a CCTV system that operates at all times when licensable activities are taking place.
2. The system will incorporate a camera covering each of the entrance doors and the main alcohol display area and will be capable of providing an image which is regarded as identification standard. The precise positions of the camera may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
3. The system will incorporate a recording facility and any recording will be retained and stored in a suitable and secure manner for a minimum of 30 days and will be made available, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, to the police for inspection on request.
4. The system must be able to export recorded images to a removable means e.g. CD/DVD and have its own software enabled to allow playback/review.
5. A member of staff trained in the use of the CCTV system must be available at the premises at all times the premises are open to the public.
6. The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of recording.
7. There shall be no sale of single cans of beers, lager or cider from the premises and no single bottles of beer, lager or cider in vessels of less than 500ml or more than 1500ml.
8. There shall be no sale of beer, lager or cider with an AVB content of 5.5%AVB or above save for premium products which have been agreed with the police (email authority will suffice).
9. There shall be no self service of spirits except for spirit mixers.
10. The store will join Cambridge Business Against Crime (Cambac) and operate a Cambac radio. This will be used by a responsible member of staff or security officer.
11. The applicant will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff and security. Such staff and security levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.
12. Signage will be displayed at the exit of the premises requesting customers leaving the premises late at night to do so quietly and with consideration so as not to disturb nearby residents.

13. The premises licence holder will ensure that an age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence.
14. All staff engaged or to be engaged in the sale of alcohol on the premises shall receive the following training in age restricted sales:
 - induction training which must be completed and documented prior to the sale of alcohol by the staff member;
 - refresher/reinforcement training at intervals of no more than 6 months.Training records will be kept at the premises available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.
15. All cashiers shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals register. The register will contain:
 - details of the time and date the refusal was made;
 - the identity of the staff member refusing the sale;
 - details of the alcohol the person attempted to purchase.The register will be available for inspection by a police officer or other authorised officer on request.

1.4 In accordance with the regulations of the Act, the application was advertised on the premises and in the Cambridge News to invite representations from responsible authorities and other persons. The last date for submitting representations was the 13 February 2015.

1.5 Representations have been received from 166 Other Persons, (162 against the application, 4 in support) and one petition. The representations are attached to the report as Appendix B and the petition as Appendix C. No representations were received from any of the Responsible Authorities but Environmental Health has agreed the following condition:

“Collections from and or deliveries to the premises (save for newspapers and magazines), shall only take place between the hours of 07:00 and 23:00. This shall include the placing of waste, including bottles, into waste receptacles outside the premises and the emptying of waste receptacles by a waste contractor.”

The agreed condition and the reasons given for Environmental Health not making a representation are attached to the report as Appendix D.

1.6 The application needs to be determined.

2. RECOMMENDATIONS

2.1 That Members' determine the application on its individual merits having reference to the statutory licensing objectives and Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

3. BACKGROUND

3.1 The premises are located within a cumulative impact area. It is therefore subject to a special policy on cumulative impact. The special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within cumulative impact areas for new premises licences or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced. The cumulative impact policy has been referred to in the representations but has not been addressed explicitly in the application.

3.2 The Council's Statement of Licensing Policy contains information on the cumulative impact.

3.3 There is currently a Premises Licence in operation at the premises. PRECAM 000396 is held by Mrs Daksha Brahmhatt in respect of MACE, 78-80 Mill Road, Cambridge, CB1 2AS. The Premises Licence, showing the permitted licensable activities and permitted hours along with the conditions in force on this licence is attached to the report as Appendix E. Sainsbury's Supermarkets Limited do, if they so wish, have the option to apply to transfer this Premises Licence from Mrs Brahmhatt to themselves. Only Cambridgeshire Constabulary can object to an application to transfer a Premises Licence. The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states: "In exceptional circumstances where the chief officer of the police believes the transfer may undermine the crime prevention objective, the police may object to the transfer. Such objections are expected to be rare and arise because the police have evidence that the business or individuals seeking to hold the licence or businesses or individuals linked to such persons are involved in crime (or disorder)."

If Sainsbury's applied to transfer the Premises Licence, and it was granted, then the licensing activities and conditions on Premises Licence PRECAM 000396 would remain in place. If Sainsbury's wish to add extra licensing activities and/or changes to the hours of operation they would have to make an application to vary the Premises Licence PRECAM 000396.

3.4 In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy and additionally the statutory guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The relevant sections from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy are:

- Objectives, section 2
- Fundamental principles, section 4
- Cumulative impact, section 5
- Licensing Hours, section 6
- Licence Conditions, section 8

4. CONSULTATIONS

4.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applications made under section 17 of the Act to be served on the Responsible Authorities and also advertised on the premises and in a local newspaper circulating within the vicinity of the premises. During the consultation period, Responsible Authorities and Other Persons (any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities) may make a representation in respect of the application.

4.2 Statutory consultation has therefore taken place with Responsible Authorities and interested parties in accordance with the procedures set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and associated regulations made under the Act.

5. OPTIONS

5.1 Whilst having reference to the information provided by the applicant and the interested party and also Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Sub-Committee's decision must be made with a view to promoting one or more of the four licensing objectives, namely:

- (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
- (b) public safety;
- (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and
- (d) the protection of children from harm.

- 5.2 Members should take such steps that they consider are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Sub-Committee may resolve:
- (a) to grant the licence subject to the mandatory conditions and those conditions offered by the applicant which may be modified to such extent as the authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives,
 - (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - (d) to reject the application.

5.3 Members must give reasons for their decision.

6. CONCLUSIONS

- 6.1 The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Licensing Act 2003 to promote the Licensing Objectives. Each objective has equal importance. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy, and the Statutory Guidance under the Licensing Act 2003 and it is bound by the Human Rights Act 1998. The Council must also fulfil its obligations under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in Cambridge.

7. IMPLICATIONS

a) Financial Implications

Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) has a statutory duty to determine applications made under the Licensing Act 2003. The application fees associated with such applications are set by Central Government and are intended to cover the cost of administering the licensing regime.

There are no specific financial implications associated with this report.

(b) Staffing Implications

There are no staffing implications associated with this report.

(c) Equal Opportunities Implications

No Equality Impact Assessment has been conducted as the only consideration in reaching a decision is whether the granting of the application will undermine the statutory licensing objectives.

(d) **Environmental Implications**

Any environmental implications that need to be considered must specifically relate to the promotion of the statutory licensing objectives and will be contained in the representations made by the responsible authorities or interested parties.

(e) **Community Safety**

Cambridge Constabulary, Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service, Cambridge City Council's Environmental Health Team, Cambridge City Council's Planning Service, Cambridgeshire County Council's Child Protection & Review Unit, Cambridgeshire County Council's Trading Standards Department and the Public Health Director were consulted as part of the application process and could have made representation if it was considered that the granting of the application would undermine one or more of the statutory licensing objectives.

Those making representations would have raised any relevant community safety implications.





Later opening will only make this worse. In fact, much worse as this outlet would simply encourage late drinkers to remain in the area and consume even more alcohol. There are a sufficient number of premises selling alcohol in the area at such times and to grant this application will increase the cumulative impact.

We are therefore strongly opposed to this application.

It is only the south side of Mill Road which is commercial in character while the north side of Mill Road on the Petersfield stretch is almost entirely residential, comprising owner occupier and family accommodation with a high concentration of sheltered housing for the elderly. For Sainsbury's to sell alcohol until late in the evening has the potential to create a public nuisance of noisy behaviour, litter and disorder.

I would like to object strongly to the application for licensing hours by the new Sainsbury's shop in Mill Road. In our neighbourhood we already have a large number of alcohol outlets including shops and pubs. We also have a long experience of anti-social drinking on the streets and in the cemetery.

This results in noisy groups walking through our neighbourhood, for example on the way to the cycle bridge in Devonshire Road, shouting and damaging cars on their way. This happens very frequently now. We don't feel able to sleep in bedrooms facing the street as we are constantly woken up by rowdy people who have drunk too much.

It is also very unpleasant to walk up Mill road and surrounding areas in the evening and at night as people accost us. We would like to be able to use the street for social purposes such as eating in local restaurants but feel deterred by the likelihood of rowdiness and being accosted on the street.

We do not need any further exacerbation of this behaviour. We are happy for people to enjoy a sociable drink but the easy availability of supermarket 'cheap' drink simply increases this unpleasant behaviour. We don't need it to be increased in this way. Please do not add to our problems - it is not necessary.

Re: Sainsbury's Application for Alcohol Licence for 78-80 Mill Road

I am writing to object to the application by Sainsbury's to sell alcohol from 78-80 Mill Road (Mace), between the hours of 7am and 11pm seven days a week.

I wish to object on the following grounds:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public Safety
- Public Nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

Below I list some of the incidents we have witnessed or reported to the police relating to the sale of alcohol from 78-80 Mill Road.

1. Our children have been frightened and followed from the existing store to our house by people buying cheap alcohol from the current store. On one occasion my daughter's friend had to run to our house and bang on the door to be let in because she was being followed from the existing store and had been grabbed at and verbally abused by a street drinker. This incident was reported to the police.
2. During the times when the current Mace store was selling alcohol to street drinkers early in the morning, street drinkers would congregate on Mill Road and Tension Road. This resulted in groups of street drinkers that would frighten and intimidate children walking on their route to school. (There are many schools in the area – St Paul's, St Matthew's, St Albans and of course Parkside). We have been verbally abused by some in these groups while walking our young children to school and I have witnessed primary school children walking on their own being shouted at directly). Granting a licence that allowed the sale of alcohol from 7am would reintroduce this problem.
3. We have also had to report an incident to the police where street drinkers have been occupied our front garden. They verbally abused and threatened to attack us when asked to move. Our children witnessed this and were shocked and disturbed by it. There have also been incidents of aggressive begging where street drinkers have knocked repeatedly on our front door (and those of other neighbours) asking for money.
4. We have also had to inform police when street drinkers have been found collapsed or unconscious when street drinkers have been found collapsed adjacent to the bag entrance of Mace, in the alley way behind the shops on this stretch of Mill Road and in the doorway of the flats on Tenison Road and the Salvation Army doorway. There have also been a number of incidents where we have seen drug-taking by street drinkers in these areas.

5. I have witnessed a woman being knocked clean off her bike outside the current Mace store by a street drinker falling into the road leaving the store. This incident occurred mid-afternoon.
6. The noise disturbance from students in this section of Tenison Road is well-documented. Residents have been working hard with ARU to tackle this problem – this application will undermine these efforts. The problem is exacerbated by students buying large quantities of cheap alcohol from the current store in the evenings either on their way to late night parties or on their way home. Longer licencing hours will attract more students.
7. There is also an issue of noise disturbance from people walking to catch late trains having been out drinking in Cambridge. The availability of alcohol at the proposed late hours will only attract more people to the area who are likely to cause even more disturbance at these late hours.

We have lived on Tenison Road for nearly ten years and for this entire time we have suffered from significant disturbance from street drinkers, students and others. The proximity to Ditchburn Place, the cemetery, the doorways at the top of Tenison Road and the train station make this an attractive place to purchase cheap alcohol and leads to all of the issues outlined above.

It is for the reasons cited above that this area is a cumulative impact zone. The Sainsbury's application fails to mention this or in any way address concerns of local residents in this regard. The suggestion by Sainsbury's that they will address this issue by displaying a sign demonstrates that they have no understanding or sensitivity to the serious drink-related issues that this community has been facing. Although Sainsbury's have said they will not sell single cans of beer or cider, this is no guarantee that they will not sell the kind of cheap, strong cider and lager commonly bought by the street drinkers and students.

The cumulative impact of increasing the hours in which alcohol can be sold from this site will only increase the problems of safety, nuisance, crime and disorder. It is for this reason that we object to the licence application being granted. Rejecting this licence will support the work of local residents, the police and others to maintain and enhance the quality of life in our community.

I write with reference to the application by Sainsburys' for a licence to sell alcohol at their new premises at 80 Mill Road.

Although under its current proprietor the premises has an alcohol licence, I would urge the planning committee to reject this application.

A few years ago Mill Road was designated a cumulative impact zone to enable the licensing authorities to exercise greater control over the availability of alcohol in this area. Since there are already a number of other alcohol outlets (including Cambridge Wine Merchants, Nip In, Bacchanalia and International Stores) in the short section of Mill Road between the Parkside Pool and Gywdir Street, it can hardly be argued that there is a shortage of such establishments. Indeed, this is surely an opportunity to apply cumulative impact status in an attempt to reduce some of the alcohol-related problems in Mill Road and the surrounding streets.

The area surrounding Mill Road is residential in character but suffers from the effects of the ready availability of alcohol and its consumption in the streets. These include late-night noise, threatening behaviour especially in Mill Road itself and littering of the streets and front gardens. There are in particular two features of this application which threaten to increase these problems:

1. I note that the application is for sales between the hours of 0700 and 23.00. Such hours might be appropriate for an out-of-town supermarket, but this hardly seems appropriate in the middle of a residential area. One might, indeed, question the point of a licence to sell alcohol in this area at 0700 unless it is for street-consumption: my neighbours are, I imagine, either in bed at this time or preparing for work.
2. While the presence of Sainsburys in Mill Road offers potential benefits to local residents, as part of a major supermarket chain Sainsburys will be able to sell alcohol at lower prices than the current establishment. Again, given the problems of street drinking in this area this is hardly desirable or, indeed, consistent with cumulative impact status.

For these reasons I would urge you to reject Sainsburys' application for an alcohol licence.

I have no doubt the CIZ policy has reduced problems in Mill Road. Every chance should be taken to strengthen the policy and oppose or severely restrict certain alcohol licences. I live (and sleep) directly on Mill Road and walk the Road daily. Personally, I am most affected by (a) street drinkers and (b) noisy groups in the Road, especially late at night \ early in the morning. Clearly supermarket alcohol sales, especially of discounted multi-packs, are more likely than specialist off-licences to fuel excessive drinking. Late night sales are especially problematic, and can involve less-trained, part-time staff. I am an undergraduate student at the University of Cambridge and also work at the Little Waitrose in the Grafton Quarter.

As such I experience living in this city as both an academic and a permanent, employed resident.

In the former capacity I feel the benefit of Cambridge being a dry city. It makes the learning environment both safer and quieter, and arguably cheaper.

In the latter capacity, given that my store has an alcohol licence, I know from experience that by selling alcohol we invite certain problems -such as shoplifting and antisocial behaviour out side the store (particularly at times like New Years Eve). Due to Waitrose being considered expensive in regards to alcohol pricing, we do not get many students or young residents shopping for alcohol. Sainsbury's is quite different however. It would be hard to imagine that rates of drunken anti social behaviour would not increase if Sainsbury's started selling cheap alcohol. It would also jeopardise the learning environment if students were more readily able to buy from retailers instead of drinking in the safer, more restricted college environment.

It is the role of the retailers and council members (and indeed us residents) to ensure that the environment of this city is maintained as a peaceable and safe one - not only for the students learning here but also for those of us who live here. As the proposed Sainsbury's store falls within a cumulative alcohol impact zone I believe that this application should be rejected.

Dear Licensing Officer,

Both as an individual local resident and on behalf of the Mill Road Society, I wish to register my objection to the application for an alcohol licence by Sainsbury's, in respect of 78-80 Mill Road, Cambridge.

Summary

We (the Mill Road Society) think that all the licensing objectives would be undermined by the granting of an alcohol licence for this proposed store. It would conflict with the designation of Mill Road as a cumulative impact zone (CIZ) – a policy that has been entirely ignored in this application.

We do not think that the applicant can effectively meet any of the four licensing objectives in relation to a store at this site. This is because of

1. The existing problems in the Mill Road area, which have led to the creation of a CIZ and to the proposal for Public Space Protection Orders in areas very close to 78-80 Mill Road;
2. Evidence from the operating schedule that the applicant shows no awareness of, let alone intends to make any attempt to address, the area's existing problems relating to the licensing objectives. The applicant, in other words, will not be able to promote the licensing objectives if they have not familiarised themselves with the barriers to doing so;
3. Our understanding that the applicant relies on high-volume alcohol sales to make a profit in its Local format stores, which would clearly be an unacceptable basis on which to apply for a licence in a CIZ.

Objections

THE CUMULATIVE IMPACT ZONE

As you know, Cambridge City Council extended its cumulative impact policy to cover Mill Road in 2008. This was done on the recommendation of the police and reflected the views of a hundred local residents who wrote to the council during the consultation period (compared with only one who wrote to oppose it). The designation of Mill Road as a CIZ thus reflected both the professional judgement of the police and overwhelming public opinion.

In asking the council to consider extending the cumulative impact policy to Mill Road, Chief Superintendent Rob Needle stated that:

Mill Road suffers a [...] disproportionate level of alcohol related disorder and crime linked to the density of licensed premises in the area [...] Mill Road has previously been identified as suffering the highest rate of violence against the person, hate crime, and anti-social behaviour in Cambridge City
(Cambridge City Council Statement of Licensing Policy, Appendix 3)

Local residents who commented on the CIZ proposals identified a range of reasons why the policy should be extended to Mill Road, including problems of violence and anti-social behaviour (ASB). As many of them noted, these are not problems that are confined to weekend evenings (although evidence suggests that this is when problems requiring police intervention are at their most acute on Mill Road), but they are also strongly linked to the continuing presence of street drinkers in the area, who present ASB issues throughout the week and across the day, and to the effects of early-evening pre-loading by students who occupy the large number of HMOs in the immediate vicinity of the proposed store.

This area of Mill Road has been the subject of concerted attempts by the council and police to address long-standing problems related to the sale of alcohol in the area. As a number of residents noted during the CIZ consultation, and as the council's statement of licensing policy notes, this is a problem specifically linked to off-licence sales by convenience stores. We think that all the considerations that led to the creation of the CIZ still apply and, in particular, apply to the granting of off-licences.

As a result of the specific, alcohol-related problems associated with the area – which we, like other local residents, observe on a daily basis – we are of the strong opinion that the problems associated with the granting of an off-licence could not be effectively addressed by reducing the hours of alcohol sale. We think that, for this reason, even if there were no other problems with this application the granting of this licence on Mill Road would, in itself, undermine all four licensing objectives. However, there are, additionally some very serious additional problems with this application.

THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

The operating schedule makes no attempt to address the particular issues connected to this area, in particular the presence of a Cumulative Impact Policy.

The council's document *Cambridge City Council Statement of Licensing Policy* states that the cumulative impact policy:

Creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within the [CIZ] areas [...] for new premises licences or club premises certificates or variations that

are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced. Applicants will need to address the special policy issues in their operating schedules in order to rebut such a presumption.

The operating schedule supplied by the applicant shows no awareness of the existence of the Mill Road CIZ. This is particularly surprising since the applicant has been engaged in attempts to acquire a site within the Mill Road CIZ since 2011 and should therefore be very familiar with the area and its alcohol-related problems. It is all the more surprising given the applicant's stated aim to be a 'good neighbour' in Mill Road, and their claim to have 'extensive experience in bringing stores of this kind to areas like this' and in 'building positive relationships with the communities we operate in'. We cannot understand why a national retailer with a stated commitment to both best practice on alcohol sales and to positive community engagement has not attempted to address the issue of the CIZ in its operating schedule, as the council requires applicants to do.

Instead, section M of the operating schedule is identical to those in other applications for alcohol licences for Sainsbury's Local stores made over recent years. The operating schedule appears to be a template one that is used in any Sainsbury's Local application, irrespective of the particular character and problems of the local area. **We do not think that a template response to the licensing objectives is sufficient in an application for a licence to sell alcohol in a CIZ with significant problems of street drinking and other types of drink-related violent crime and ASB.**

The failure of the application to meet the requirements for the award of an alcohol off-licence in a CIZ is evident when the specific conditions offered by the applicant are offered. As already noted, the worst alcohol-related problems in the area concern the first three licensing objectives. The applicant's offered conditions address none of them adequately.

1. The prevention of crime and disorder

The applicant offers ten proposed conditions which it claims will promote this licensing objective. While many of them may reduce the effects of crime on the store itself, by deterring shoplifters, none of them are likely to have any meaningful impact on the problems of crime and disorder outside the proposed store; in fact, some of them are likely to make the current problems in the Mill Road CIZ worse.

Six of the ten offered conditions relate only to the maintenance of CCTV in the store, which – although presumably helpful to the applicant in reducing shoplifting – has no effect on violence, disturbance or any other ASB outside the store itself. One other offered condition relates to proposed membership of Cambridge Business Against Crime which, while laudable, does not relate to the way in which alcohol would be marketed and sold in the store. This means that only three conditions relate to sale of alcohol itself. All of these are template conditions, routinely offered by Sainsbury's in their applications for licences for their Local stores around the country, rather than considered responses to the problems of the local area. Not surprisingly, therefore,

none of them will meaningfully address any of the problems that affect this area of Petersfield ward.

Conditions 7 and 8: The applicant proposes that no non-premium beer or cider with an ABV of 5.5% or above would be sold and that single bottles of beer, lager, or cider for sale would be between 500ml and 1500ml in size. This would not prevent the sale of, for example, multipacks of Stella Artois ("nicknamed "Wife Beater" in the United Kingdom, due to a perceived connection with aggression and binge drinking"), or Sainsbury's own brand dry cider (5.3% ABV). These types of alcohol are routinely on promotion in Sainsbury's stores, including in Local format stores (see, for example, the images at Appendix A). This means that cheap and, by most people's standards, strong lager and cider could, and we assume would, still be sold at this store.

Condition 9: The applicant states that there would be no self-service of spirits except for spirit mixtures. Proposing self-service of spirit mixtures in a CIZ is wholly irresponsible, not least because many of those spirit mixtures sold by Sainsbury's have a higher ABV than the strong beer and cider on which they offer conditions. For example, spirit mixtures currently sold by Sainsbury's include 250ml cans of 'Smirnoff and Cranberry Juice' and 'Archers Woo Woo' with an ABV of 6.4%, 'Greenall's Gin and Pink Grapefruit' (6.5% ABV), and 275ml of Jack Daniels and Cola (6% ABV) which is packaged to look like a small bottle of Jack Daniels (see attached images at Appendix b). As the images show, these types of alcohol are often the subject of special offers by Sainsbury's; we do not think that a proposal for self-service, strong, discounted alcohol can possibly be seen as an appropriate in a CIZ.

It should also be noted, of course, that the applicant offers no condition limiting the sale of spirits (as opposed to their position in the store) and we assume that they intend to make cheap spirits available for sale as they do in other Local format stores – including their 'Sainsbury's Basics' vodka, which I saw on sale in a Local format store two days ago. This is a particular problem in an area that suffers from ASB and other forms of crime connected to pre-loading by students in the area's many HMOs.

In summary, most of the proposed conditions do nothing at all to address the prevention of crime and disorder objective outside the store itself. The three conditions that are concerned with the type of alcohol sold and the way it would be sold in the store will not prevent the types of alcohol-related crime and disorder that characterise this area and that are the reason for the CIZ.

Although we are concerned about the proposed hours of alcohol sale in respect of this objective, it should be noted that reduced hours would remain deeply problematic. As local residents and the police have noted before, alcohol-related ASB in the Mill Road area is not restricted to any particular time of day. I have personally reported several incidents of alcohol-related ASB occurring during the day and within less than 100m of the proposed store.

2. Public safety

The application states that 'the applicant will at all times maintain adequate levels of staff and security'. This is apparently the only way in which the applicant proposes to promote the licensing objective relating to public safety. In addition to its obvious vagueness, which gives local residents no reassurance at all, staffing levels in the

proposed store can necessarily only attempt to address public safety inside the store itself. In our experience, most alcohol-related threats to public safety in the Mill Road area do not occur inside stores but outside them. We think that this is likely to be a particular issue given the existence of an ATM machine at the site and the proximity of the site to areas where street drinking regularly occurs, some of which are being considered for Public Space Protection Orders.

3. The prevention of public nuisance

As already said and as is very well known, the area around the proposed store suffers from serious, long-standing problems in this regard. The applicant claims to be able to promote this objective satisfactorily by putting up a sign asking customers to leave quietly late at night. As anyone with even the most minimal knowledge of the area would know, this could not remotely begin to meet the requirements relating to the objective.

The final licensing objective, relating to the protection of children from harm, is addressed in the application via the applicant's standard conditions for Local format stores. It does not, however, address the issue of proxy sales which are a particular problem in this area of Petersfield ward because of the number of mixed-age language school and summer school residencies in the immediate area (there are at least two within approximately 100m of this site).

THE PROPOSED STORE'S RELIANCE ON ALCOHOL SALES

The disregard for the Mill Road CIZ and the failure of the proposed conditions to promote the licensing objectives are of particular concern because of the extent to which the applicant is dependent on alcohol sales in stores of this format. As is widely known, convenience format stores operated by businesses such as the applicant's rely on a high volume of alcohol sales to generate a profit. We think that this is why a lawyer acting for the applicant told a licensing hearing last year that:

If you took alcohol out of the store, the incremental impact is very significant. I'm virtually sure that Sainsbury's Local wouldn't open this store if it didn't get the alcohol licence.

In this context, we note that it is our understanding that the applicant has not yet finalised its lease of 78-80 Mill Road; we further understand that they are waiting for the outcome of this licence application before deciding whether or not to proceed with the lease.

We think that it would be completely inappropriate to grant an alcohol licence to a store that depends so heavily on alcohol sales to make a profit that it will now only open stores of this format if it can sell alcohol in them. We think that this is a particularly dangerous feature of the application when considered in conjunction with the range of cheap, strong alcohol that the applicant routinely sells in its Local stores.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, both the nature of the area itself and the specific character of this application mean that granting an alcohol licence in this case would strongly conflict with the licensing objectives. We strongly oppose the application.




Environmental Health has no representation to make. However, I recommend that the following condition be attached, which have been agreed with the applicant:

Environmental Health will not be raising a representation against the application by Sainsbury's for a premise's licence for 78-80 Mill Road, Cambridge.

In their application Sainsbury's have agreed to signage requesting patrons to leave quietly and now a condition restricting deliveries, please see the attached email. These conditions with further protect the surrounding residents from disturbance.

I am aware that objections have been received and the Sub- Committee may find the following useful.

Mace Stores, 78-80 Mill Road, already has a premises licence, reference PRECAM 00039 that authorises the supply of alcohol between 08:00 and 23:00 every day. Sainsbury's is applying to supply alcohol 07:00 and 23:00 every day. If the application by Sainsbury's is refused Sainsbury's can still apply to transfer the existing premises licence from Mace Stores to Sainsbury's. In effect this is an application to increase the trading hours by an extra hour every day.

This current premises licence does not have the conditions Sainsbury's has agreed to.

I have checked Environmental Health's records. Sporadic complaints are normal but, Environmental Health has no record of ongoing problems from either the current Mace Store or other Sainsbury's stores in the City. Both have a good record of compliance.

A planning application reference 15/0169/FUL, "Alterations to shop front comprising replacement glazing, automatic sliding door and replacement ATM, new rear access staircase and new rear fire escape. Demolition and rebuilding of rear extension (no increase in floor space). Replacement external plant," is currently being determined.

New plant, such as chillers, will have to conform to planning requirements and will be almost inaudible. Any new building work will have to meet current building regulations. The new licence and planning application will improve the current store so that it will meet current standards. This will make public nuisance less likely and improve public safety.

Environmental Health has no evidence that the current premises licence is or the proposed premise licence will be detrimental to the licensing objectives.

Agreed Condition:

Collections from and or deliveries to the premises (save for newspapers and magazines), shall only take place between the hours of 07:00 and 23:00. This shall include the placing of waste, including bottles, into waste receptacles outside the premises and the emptying of waste receptacles by a waste contractor.


