Preliminary Matters

- 1. **The Chair** will commence the hearing by introducing him/herself, the other two members of the Sub-Committee and the officers present.
- 2. **The Chair** will ask the applicant(s)/the responsible authorities/the interested parties present, and their representatives (if applicable), to introduce themselves and identify their interest in the proceedings.

Failure of a party to attend the hearing

- 3. If a party has informed the licensing authority that he/she does not intend to attend or be represented at a hearing, the hearing may proceed in his/her absence.
- 4. If a party who has not so indicated fails to attend or be represented at a hearing, the Sub-Committee may
 - (a) where it considers it to be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the hearing to a specified date, or
 - (b) hold the hearing in the party's absence.
- 5. Where the Sub-Committee holds the hearing in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will consider at the hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.
- 6. **The Chair** will explain the procedure to be followed at the hearing and will confirm whether the Sub-Committee must reach its decision at the end of the hearing or within 5 workings days of the hearing, depending on the application being heard.
- 7. The Clerk to the Sub-Committee will indicate whether any party has requested permission for any other person(s) (other than his/her representative) to appear at the hearing to assist the Sub-Committee in relation to the application, representations or notice of the party making the request. The Sub-Committee will decide whether to grant permission to allow any other person(s) to appear at the hearing on behalf of the party; such permission will not be unreasonably withheld.
- 8. The Clerk to the Sub-Committee will ask whether any party is seeking to introduce any document(s) or other information not previously disclosed to all the other parties to the hearing and the licensing authority. If all the other parties consent, the previously undisclosed document(s) or other information can be produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable).
- 9. The hearing will take the form of a discussion led by the Chair of the Sub-Committee. Cross-examination will not be permitted unless the Sub-Committee considers that cross-examination is required to

consider the representations, application or notice as the case may require.

- 10.The Sub-Committee will consider any requests to permit crossexamination on a case-by-case basis. When permission is given to one party, it will also normally be extended to all other parties.
- **11.**The Sub-Committee will decide the equal maximum period of time that each party will have to present their case.

The Hearing

- 12. The Licensing Officer will present the report to the Sub-Committee.
- 13.Members may ask any relevant questions of the Licensing Officer.
- 14. The applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, will present their case first.
- 15. The party shall be entitled to:
 - (a) give further information in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) in response to a specific request by the licensing authority prior to the hearing;
 - (b) question any other party (if permission has been given by the Sub-Committee);
 - (c) address the Sub-Committee.
- 16.If the Police are a party to the hearing, they will present their case. The Police have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 17.If any other "responsible authority" are a party to the hearing, they will present their case in turn after the Police and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 18. Any other interested parties will then present their case in turn and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 19.Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of the/each party or any other person permitted to appear at the hearing in support of the party.
- 20.**The Chair** will invite the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and any parties making representations, to briefly summarise their points if they wish.
- 21.**The Chair** will ask the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and all parties making representations, that they are satisfied that they have said all they wish to.

The Decision

22.In considering any representations or notice made by a party, the Sub-Committee may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.

- 23.In reaching its decision, the Sub-Committee will disregard any information given by a party, or any person who has been permitted to appear at the hearing, which is not relevant to
 - (a) the application, representations or notice (as applicable) or in the case of another person, the application, representations or notice of the party requesting their appearance, and
 - (b) the promotion of the licensing objectives or, in relation to a hearing to consider a notice given by the Police, the crime prevention objective.
- 24. The Sub-Committee may consider its decision in private and may move into private session where it considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in that part of the hearing taking place in public. If the Sub-Committee do move into private session then all the parties and their representatives, any other person permitted to appear at the hearing, officers, the public and the press will be asked to leave the room whilst the decision is made.

The Chair will tell those present at the meeting the decision taken by the Sub-Committee and the reasons for the decision.

INTRODUCTION

1.1 An application under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 for a Premises Licence to be granted in respect of Tesco Stores Ltd, Unit 1, 172 East Road, Cambridge, CB1 1BG has been received from Tesco Stores Ltd, Shire Park, Kestrel Way, Welwyn Garden City, Hertfordshire, AL7 1GA. The application was served on Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) on 10th December 2018. A copy of the application was also served on each responsible authority. The application and plans of the premises is attached to the report at Appendix A.

- 1.2 The applicant is seeking a premises licence to supply alcohol (off the premises) between 07:00 and 22:00 Monday to Sunday inclusive, with opening hours of the premises from 06:00 to 23:00 Monday to Sunday inclusive.
- 1.3 In accordance with the regulations of the Act, the application was advertised on the premises and in the Cambridge News to invite representations from responsible authorities and other persons. The last date for submitting representations was 7th January 2019.
- 1.4 Representations were received from six other persons, attached to the report as Appendix B. No representations were received from any of the Responsible Authorities however Cambridge Constabulary agreed conditions with the applicant before the application was submitted (Annex 1 of the Application form). Cambridge Constabulary agreed a further condition with the applicant relating to CCTV during the representation period.
- 1.5 If members are minded to grant the application, these conditions would be added to the premises licence along with the other conditions offered by the applicant within the operating schedule. Members can also choose to add further conditions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives if so minded.
- 1.6 A copy of the conditions agreed between the applicant and Cambridge Constabulary, along with the conditions within the operating schedule are attached to this report as Appendix C.
- 1.7 The application needs to be determined.

2. **RECOMMENDATION**

2.1 That Members determine the application on its individual merits having reference to the statutory licensing objectives and Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

3. BACKGROUND

3.1 The premises are located within a cumulative impact area. It is therefore subject to a special policy on cumulative impact. The special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within cumulative impact areas for any new premises licence or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.

- 3.2 This is unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced. The Council's Statement of Licensing Policy contains information on the cumulative impact. The section relating to cumulative impact has been taken from the policy and attached to the report as Appendix D.
- 3.3 Two previous applications have been made for a Premises Licence to be issued in respect of these premises. These were received on 17th November 2009 and 10th August 2010 respectively. Both applications were refused at hearings of the Licensing Sub-Committee after relevant representations had been received.
- 3.4 In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy and additionally the statutory guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The relevant sections from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy are:
 - Objectives, section 2
 - Fundamental principles, section 4
 - Cumulative impact, section 5
 - Licensing Hours, section 6
 - Licence Conditions, section 8

4. CONSULTATIONS

- 4.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applications made under section 17 of the Act to be served on the Responsible Authorities and also advertised on the premises and in a local newspaper circulating within the vicinity of the premises. During the consultation period, Responsible Authorities and Other Persons (any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities) may make a representation in respect of the application.
- 4.2 Statutory consultation has therefore taken place with Responsible Authorities and interested parties in accordance with the procedures

set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and associated regulations made under the Act.

5. OPTIONS

- 5.1 Whilst having reference to the information provided by the applicant and the information raised in the representation and also Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Sub-Committee's decision must be made with a view to promoting one or more of the four licensing objectives, namely:
 - (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - (b) public safety;
 - (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and
 - (d) the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 Members should take such steps that they consider are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Sub-Committee may resolve:
 - (a) to grant the licence subject to the mandatory conditions and those conditions offered by the applicant which may be modified to such extent as the authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
 - (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - (d) to reject the application.
- 5.3 Members must give reasons for their decision.

6. CONCLUSIONS

6.1 The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Licensing Act 2003 to promote the Licensing Objectives. Each objective has equal importance. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy, and the Statutory Guidance under the Licensing Act 2003 and it is bound by the Human Rights Act 1998. The Council must also fulfill its obligations under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to

do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in Cambridge.

7. IMPLICATIONS

a) **Financial Implications**

Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) has a statutory duty to determine applications made under the Licensing Act 2003. The application fees associated with such applications are set by Central Government and are intended to cover the cost of administering the licensing regime.

There are no specific financial implications associated with this report.

(b) Staffing Implications

There are no staffing implications associated with this report.

(c) Equal Opportunities Implications

No Equality Impact Assessment has been conducted as the only consideration in reaching a decision is whether the granting of the application will undermine the statutory licensing objectives.

(d) Environmental Implications

Any environmental implications that need to be considered must specifically relate to the promotion of the statutory licensing objectives and will be contained in the representations made by the responsible authorities or interested parties.

(e) **Community Safety**

Cambridge Constabulary, Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service, Cambridge City Council's Environmental Health Team, Cambridge City Council's Planning Service, Cambridgeshire County Council's Child Protection & Review Unit, Cambridgeshire County Council's Trading Standards Department and the Public Health Director were consulted as part of the application process and could have made representation if it was considered that the granting of the application would undermine one or more of the statutory licensing objectives. Those making representations would have raised any relevant community safety implications.



I wish to make a representation in relation to the proposed premises license at Tesco's on East Road. I understand today is the closing date for making representations. I understand that I am entitled to make a representation as a local individual who's child attends St Matthews Primary school on Norfolk Street.

Whilst I am pleased that the Police have agreed to attach a number of conditions to the proposed sale of alcohol from Tescos, my concerns relate to where those purchasing will go to drink. As I am sure you will be aware there is considerable green space in and around the Norfolk Street and Staffordshire Gardens locality, and I would suggest that particularly in the summer months it is very likely that significant numbers of folk buying drink from Tesco will be tempted to go there to consume. This could cause considerable and on-going distress to the residents of the East Road estate, but of particular concern to me is the potential impact on children leaving school in the afternoon should they witness any drunken or disorderly behaviour. It is my understanding that there have been a history of anti-social problems in the past in this area, specifically in relation to alcohol purchased elsewhere in the locality. At that time local residents organised a successful campaign to prevent Tesco gaining a license when the shop first opened. I am not clear what has changed in the interim to make granting the license a wise move now. I am also aware that East Road is within the cumulative impact area in regard to the sale of alcohol. I am unclear as to why this shouldn't be taken into account in the granting of a new license. I am therefore making my representation to you in relation to the third and forth objectives under The Licensing Act namely, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm.

Thanks for this Alexander.

I wish to object to the application for a licence to sell alcohol at 172 East Road.

The area around the premises, has a history of considerable drinking of alcohol on the street and park areas with resultant anti-social and violent behaviour. Because of this the street is included in the Cumulative Impact Area. This has existed for many years and was reviewed and confirmed in 2017/18 by the city council. It has had some effect in containing the problem caused by excess drinking on the street however further action had to be taken and Public Space Protection Orders were added covering certain areas including Petersfield Green which is located very close to the applicant's premises.

Despite all these actions problems persist in the form of drunkenness, noise, partying, fighting, urination and defecation in public in areas near the premises. During the last year and especially in summer months residents of Petersfield Terrace, Bradmore Street and Petersfield Mansions made numerous complaints to me, and I believe the city council and police, with regard to these events. The problems still exist and allowing a further premises to sell alcohol would be to risk exacerbating the current position.

Residents have also voiced concerns about the risk of harm to children in the area – physical, moral and psychological. St Matthew's Primary School is opposite the applicant's premises and there are three children's play areas close by – on Petersfield Green, in Flower St and on the East Road estate.

For these reasons I feel that all four of the criteria for assessing licence applications are at risk if this application is allowed. ie Prevention of Crime and Disorder; Public Safety; Prevention of Public Nuisance; and Protection of children from harm.

I do not feel that the provisions suggested by the applicant for controlling the sales of alcohol from their premises, such as only selling limited strength alcohol and providing a guard on the door, would be enough to prevent the problems and risks in the area being worsened by the licence being granted.


This part of the city has a problem with aggressive beggers, rough sleepers, street drinkers, drug dealers, as well as drug users. Petersfield and Kite wards have very few, if any, police on foot patrol. People are sleeping rough in the door ways of many of the surrounding businesses, as well as in the front of the Tesco Express itself. Not to mention the fights and shouting matches that currently take place in front of the very said Tesco Express.

In their application Tesco state that they will have digital CCTV that will cover many areas of the shop floor, that a member of the Management team will ordinarily be on the premesis, as well as a security guard. They currently have a security guard on the door but still have a problem with shoplifters; management ordinarily being on the premesis doesn't sound very convincing to me either. As far as their "Good Neighbour" policy, I have never seen them engage in the community at all, just contribute to the amount of beggers and litter on East Road. To my knowledge they don't get involved with the local primary, secondary school, nor with PACT (Petersfield Area Community Trust).

I hope that the right thing will be done, and that the variation application will be turned down again.

Dear Alexander,

As a ward councillor, I wish to object to the above application for the sale of alcohol.

I am concerned about compliance with all four licensing objectives, in particular noting the premises' proximity to:

- Jimmys Homeless Hostel and Assessment Centre
- St Matthew's Primary School
- the prevalent begging, street culture in the vicinity, including immediately outside the premises concerned

The applicant's response to the third licensing objective - prevention of public nuisance - is particularly insubstantial. And the applicant's interpretation of the fourth objective - the protection of children from harm - is focused solely on under-age sales, and not at all on the impact of supplied alcohol fuelling intoxicated street behaviour on the street in front of young school children.

The retail sale of alcohol along this facade of shops has been experienced until several years ago and was clearly associated by the Police and members of the public with high intensity of begging and anti-social behaviour. An application for these premises by this same applicant has previously been rejected largely on these grounds.

Given that the premises are located within the cumulative impact area, I do not consider that the applicant has satisfactorily demonstrated why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced. Furthermore the conditions offered are significantly below, and the hours of sale proposed are significantly excess of the standards imposed on a similar operation at Sainsburys, 52-54 St Andrews Street, noting particularly:

- sales being permitted from 7am to 10pm, instead of the much more limited 11am to 8pm
- no necessary presence of the designated premises supervisor for all alcohol sales, to make and authorise the sales
- absence of permitted price controls
- no requirement for incident book, refusals register or DPS to attend meetings with the Police upon invitation
- explicit specification of necessary training.

In a number of respects, too much in this application is assumed to be regulated internally by the applicant's wider company, leaving insufficient points of specific public accountability to the licensing authority for this particular application.

In summary, I believe the applicant misunderstands the factors lying behind the cumulative impact area within the council's policy and the sensitivities inherent in this vicinity within it.

- An appointed member of staff will be present when the premises is conducting a licensable activity, who is capable and competent at using the CCTV system and downloading CCTV footage on their own recordable media, and be able to hand this footage over to the Police / Local Authority on request. There shall be no self-service of spirits at the premises.

Alcohol shall not be stored or displayed within 3 meters of the entrance/exit to the premises.

All staff will receive comprehensive training in relation to age restricted products and in particular the sale of alcohol. No member of staff will be permitted to sell age restricted products until such time as they have successfully completed the aforementioned training.

Appendix D

Section from Statement of Licensing Policy in regards to Cumulative Impact

5. The cumulative impact of a concentration of licensed premises

5.1 Cumulative impact is the potential impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives of a significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area e.g. the potential impact on crime and disorder or public nuisance.

5.2 The cumulative impact of licensed premises on the promotion of the licensing objectives is a matter that the Licensing Authority can take into account. This should not, however, be confused with 'need' which concerns the commercial demand for a particular type of premises e.g., a pub, restaurant or hotel. The issue of 'need' is therefore primarily a matter for the market to decide and does not form part of this licensing policy statement.

5.3 The Licensing Authority can only adopt a special policy on cumulative impact if there is evidence that a significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area is causing a cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives. The Licensing Authority will keep the situation as to whether an area is nearing this point under review.

5.4 The absence of a special policy does not prevent any responsible authority or other person making representations on a new application for the grant or variation of a licence on the grounds that the premises will give rise to a detrimental cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives in a particular area.

5.5 Following previous consultations and representations received by Cambridge Constabulary, the Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy on cumulative effect that remains in place.

5.6 In response to these representations the Licensing Authority has undertaken the following steps in considering whether to adopt a special policy on cumulative effect within this statement of licensing policy:

• Identified concern about crime and disorder or public nuisance

• Considered whether there is good evidence that crime and disorder are happening and are caused by customers of licensed premises and that the risk of cumulative impact is imminent

· Identified the boundaries of the areas where problems are occurring

• Consulted with those specified in section 5(3) of the Licensing Act

2003, on the proposal for a special policy in relation to new applications and variations to existing premises licences and club premises certificates and considered the outcome of the consultation

5.7 Having considered the available evidence and undertaken consultation, the Licensing Authority considers that it is appropriate and necessary to control cumulative impact. The Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to cumulative impact to the areas set out in paragraph 5.8 below.

Special Policy on Cumulative Effect

5.8 The Licensing Authority has adopted a special policy relating to cumulative impact in relation to the areas of the City:

• Within the city centre marked on the map at Appendix 1

• At the Cambridge Leisure Park marked on the map at Appendix 2.

• This area also includes the section of Cherry Hinton Road opposite the leisure park running from Hills Road to Clifton Road (both sides of the road).

• The entire length of Mill Road Cambridge (excluding Brookfields)

• The section of Hills Road running from the city to Purbeck Road (both sides of the road).

5.9 The evidence for this special policy has been supplied by Cambridge Constabulary on the grounds of Crime and Disorder and is set out in Appendix 3.

5.10 This special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within the areas set out in paragraph 5.8 for new premises licences or club premises certificates or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives, unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced.

5.11 Applicants will need to address the special policy issues in their operating schedules in order to rebut such a presumption.

5.12 Despite the presumption against grant, responsible authorities and/or other persons will still need to make a relevant representation before the Licensing Authority may lawfully consider giving effect to its special policy i.e. if no representation is received, the application must be granted (subject to such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule and any mandatory conditions required by the Licensing Act 2003). Responsible authorities and other persons can make a written representation referring to information, which had been before the Licensing Authority when it developed its statement of licensing policy.

5.13 The Licensing Authority recognises that a special policy should never be absolute. The circumstances of each application will be considered properly and applications for licences and certificates that are unlikely to add to the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives may be granted. After receiving representations in relation to a new application or for a variation of a licence or certificate, the licensing authority will consider whether it would be justified in departing from its special policy in the light of the individual circumstances of the case. The impact can be expected to be different for premises with different styles and characteristics. If the Licensing Authority decides that an application should be refused, it will still need to show that the grant of the application would undermine the promotion of the licensing objectives and that necessary conditions would be ineffective in preventing the problems involved.

5.14 This special policy will not be used:

• as a ground for revoking an existing licence or certificate when representations are received about problems with those premises

• to justify rejecting applications to vary an existing licence of certificate except where those modifications are directly relevant to the policy (as would be the case with an

application to vary a licence with a view to increasing the capacity limits of the premises) and are strictly necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives

• to include any provisions for a terminal hour in any particular area which might impose a fixed closing time akin to that under the

'permitted hours' provisions of the Licensing Act 1964

• to impose quotas - based on either the number of premises or the capacity of those premises - that restrict the consideration of any application on its individual merits or which seek to impose limitations on trading hours in particular areas. Quotas have no regard to individual characteristics of the premises concerned. Proper regard will be given to those differences and the differing impact they will have on the promotion of the licensing objectives

5.15 This special policy will be reviewed regularly to assess whether it is still needed or should be expanded

Other mechanisms for controlling cumulative impact

5.16 Once away from the licensed premises, a minority of consumers will behave badly and unlawfully. However, there are other mechanisms, both within and outside the licensing regime, that are available for addressing such issues. For example:

planning controls

• positive measures to create a safe and clean environment in partnership with local businesses, transport operators and others

• the provision of CCTV, ample taxi ranks, Cambridge BID and CAMBAC (Cambridge Business Against Crime).

• powers to designate parts of the city as places where alcohol may not be consumed publicly. There are currently 3 Public Spaces Protection Order's in place. These are Donkey Common, Mill Road Cemetery and Ditchburn Place.

• confiscation of alcohol from adults and children in designated areas

• police enforcement of the law with regard to disorder and anti-social behaviour, including the issuing of fixed penalty notices

• police powers to close some premises for up to 24 hours on the grounds of disorder, the likelihood of disorder or excessive noise

• the power of police, local businesses or residents to seek a review of the licence or certificate

• enforcement action against those selling alcohol to people who are drunk.

5.17 The above can be supplemented by other local initiatives that similarly address these problems, for example, through the Cambridge Community Safety Partnership in line with the strategic objectives for crime and disorder reduction within the City.

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
