Licensing Act 2003 - Licensing Sub-Committee: Hearings Procedure

Preliminary Matters

- 1. **The Chair** will commence the hearing by introducing him/herself, the other two members of the Sub-Committee and the officers present.
- 2. **The Chair** will ask the applicant(s)/the responsible authorities/the interested parties present, and their representatives (if applicable), to introduce themselves and identify their interest in the proceedings.

Failure of a party to attend the hearing

- 3. If a party has informed the licensing authority that he/she does not intend to attend or be represented at a hearing, the hearing may proceed in his/her absence.
- 4. If a party who has not so indicated fails to attend or be represented at a hearing, the Sub-Committee may
 - (a) where it considers it to be necessary in the public interest, adjourn the hearing to a specified date, or
 - (b) hold the hearing in the party's absence.
- 5. Where the Sub-Committee holds the hearing in the absence of a party, the Sub-Committee will consider at the hearing the application, representations or notice made by that party.
- 6. **The Chair** will explain the procedure to be followed at the hearing and will confirm whether the Sub-Committee must reach its decision at the end of the hearing or within 5 workings days of the hearing, depending on the application being heard.
- 7. The Clerk to the Sub-Committee will indicate whether any party has requested permission for any other person(s) (other than his/her representative) to appear at the hearing to assist the Sub-Committee in relation to the application, representations or notice of the party making the request. The Sub-Committee will decide whether to grant permission to allow any other person(s) to appear at the hearing on behalf of the party; such permission will not be unreasonably withheld.
- 8. The Clerk to the Sub-Committee will ask whether any party is seeking to introduce any document(s) or other information not previously disclosed to all the other parties to the hearing and the licensing authority. If all the other parties consent, the previously undisclosed document(s) or other information can be produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable).
- 9. The hearing will take the form of a discussion led by the Chair of the Sub-Committee. Cross-examination will not be permitted unless the Sub-Committee considers that cross-examination is required to

- consider the representations, application or notice as the case may require.
- 10. The Sub-Committee will consider any requests to permit crossexamination on a case-by-case basis. When permission is given to one party, it will also normally be extended to all other parties.
- **11.**The Sub-Committee will decide the equal maximum period of time that each party will have to present their case.

The Hearing

- 12. The Licensing Officer will present the report to the Sub-Committee.
- 13. Members may ask any relevant questions of the Licensing Officer.
- 14. The applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, will present their case first.
- 15. The party shall be entitled to:
 - (a) give further information in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) in response to a specific request by the licensing authority prior to the hearing;
 - (b) question any other party (if permission has been given by the Sub-Committee);
 - (c) address the Sub-Committee.
- 16.If the Police are a party to the hearing, they will present their case. The Police have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 17.If any other "responsible authority" are a party to the hearing, they will present their case in turn after the Police and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 18. Any other interested parties will then present their case in turn and have the rights listed in paragraph 15 (a) (c) above.
- 19. Members of the Sub-Committee may ask questions of the /each party or any other person permitted to appear at the hearing in support of the party.
- 20.**The Chair** will invite the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and any parties making representations, to briefly summarise their points if they wish.
- 21.**The Chair** will ask the applicant, or the party who has initiated the hearing, and all parties making representations, that they are satisfied that they have said all they wish to.

The Decision

22.In considering any representations or notice made by a party, the Sub-Committee may take into account documentary or other information produced by a party in support of their application, representations or notice (as applicable) either before the hearing or, with the consent of all the other parties, at the hearing.

- 23.In reaching its decision, the Sub-Committee will disregard any information given by a party, or any person who has been permitted to appear at the hearing, which is not relevant to
 - (a) the application, representations or notice (as applicable) or in the case of another person, the application, representations or notice of the party requesting their appearance, and
 - (b) the promotion of the licensing objectives or, in relation to a hearing to consider a notice given by the Police, the crime prevention objective.
- 24. The Sub-Committee may consider its decision in private and may move into private session where it considers that the public interest in so doing outweighs the public interest in that part of the hearing taking place in public. If the Sub-Committee do move into private session then all the parties and their representatives, any other person permitted to appear at the hearing, officers, the public and the press will be asked to leave the room whilst the decision is made.

The Chair will tell those present at the meeting the decision taken by the Sub-Committee and the reasons for the decision.

INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 An application under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 for a Premises Licence to be issued in respect of Best One Express, 4 Fitzroy St, Cambridge, CB1 1EW has been received from Dilip Bathula. It was served on Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) on 19th October 2021.
- 1.2 The applicant is seeking a Premises Licence to supply alcohol off the premises only between 10:00 and 22:00 Monday to Sunday. The application is attached to the report as <u>Appendix A</u> with a proposed plan of the Premises attached at Appendix B.
- 1.3 In accordance with the regulations of the Act the application was advertised on the premises and in a local newspaper to invite representations from responsible authorities and other persons. The last date for submitting representations was 16th November 2021.
- 1.4 During the representation period the applicant agreed to the condition shown below put forward by Environmental Health under the Prevention of Public Nuisance Licensing objective.
 - "Collections from and or deliveries to the premises, shall only take place between the hours of 07:00 and 23:00. This shall include the placing of waste, including bottles, into waste receptacles outside the premises and the emptying of waste receptacles outside the premises and the emptying of waste receptacles by a waste contractor."
- 1.5 The applicant also agreed to the addition of 16 conditions proposed by the Police under the Licensing Objectives (Listed below at Point 5). These are shown at Appendix C.
- 1.6 A representation was received on 15th November 2021 from one other person attached to the report at <u>Appendix D.</u>
- 1.7 No representations were received from any of the other Responsible Authorities.
- 1.8 The application needs to be determined.

2. RECOMMENDATION

2.1 Members must determine the application on its individual merits having reference to the statutory licensing objectives and Cambridge City Council's 'Statement of Licensing Policy'.

3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The premises are located within the city centre cumulative impact area. It is therefore subject to a special policy on cumulative impact. The special policy creates a rebuttable presumption that applications within cumulative impact areas for any new premises licence or variations that are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives.
- 3.2 This is unless, under Section 4.9 of the Cumulative Impact Assessment, the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced.
- 3.3 In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy, the Cumulative Impact Assessment and additionally the statutory guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The relevant sections from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy are:
 - Objectives Section 2
 - Fundamental Principles Section 4
 - Cumulative Impact Section 5
 - Licensing Hours Section 6
 - Licence Conditions Section 8

4. CONSULTATIONS

4.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applications made under section 17 of the 'Act' to be served on the Responsible Authorities and they must also advertise on the premises and in a local newspaper circulating within the vicinity of the premises. During the consultation period, Responsible Authorities and Other Persons (any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities) may make a representation in respect of the application.

4.2 Statutory consultation has therefore taken place with Responsible Authorities and interested parties in accordance with the procedures set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and associated regulations made under the 'Act'.

5. OPTIONS

- 5.1 Whilst having reference to the information provided by the applicant and the information raised in the representation and also Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Sub-Committee's decision must be made with a view to promoting one or more of the four licensing objectives, namely:
 - (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - (b) public safety;
 - (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and
 - (d) the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 Members should take such steps that they consider are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Sub-Committee may resolve:
 - (a) to grant the licence subject to the mandatory conditions and those conditions offered by the applicant which may be modified to such extent as the authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
 - (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
 - (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
 - (d) to reject the application.
- 5.3 Members must give reasons for their decision.

6. CONCLUSIONS

6.1 The Licensing Authority has a duty under the 'Act' to promote the Licensing Objectives. Each objective has equal importance. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy, and the Statutory Guidance under the Licensing Act 2003 and it is bound by the Human

Rights Act 1998. The Council must also fulfill its obligations under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in Cambridge.

7. IMPLICATIONS

a) Financial Implications

Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) has a statutory duty to determine applications made under the Licensing Act 2003. The application fees associated with such applications are set by Central Government and are intended to cover the cost of administering the licensing regime.

There are no specific financial implications associated with this report.

(b) Staffing Implications

There are no staffing implications associated with this report.

(c) Equal Opportunities Implications

No Equality Impact Assessment has been conducted as the only consideration in reaching a decision is whether the granting of the application will undermine the statutory licensing objectives.

(d) Environmental Implications

Any environmental implications that need to be considered must specifically relate to the promotion of the statutory licensing objectives and will be contained in the representations made by the responsible authorities or interested parties.

(e) Community Safety

Cambridge Constabulary, Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service, Cambridge City Council's Environmental Health Team, Cambridge City Council's Planning Service, Cambridgeshire County Council's Child Protection & Review Unit, Cambridgeshire County Council's Trading Standards Department and the Public Health Director were consulted as part of the application process and could have made representation if it was considered that the granting of the application would undermine one or more of the statutory licensing objectives.

Those making representations would have raised any relevant community safety implications.

For example the type of premises, its general situation and layout and any other information which could be relevant to the licensing objectives. The premises trades as a small convenience store in Cambridge city centre, and is seeking to offer the sale of alcohol for consumption off the premises. It has become necessary for the applicant to seek additional product ranges to ensure the business has a chance of success in the future. The introduction of a small off sales range will increase the overall basket spend of his regular customers. This application is not made with the intention of pulling in new customers from all over Cambridge, but merely to provide the full convenience store experience to the existing customer base, a basket spend of £8 rather than £4 can be the difference between survival or not. The applicant is aware that the premises falls within the city centre CIA, but is asking, having considered the application that you accept this as an exception to the policy.

LICENSING OBJECTIVES

Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General - all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e)

List here steps you will take to promote all four licensing objectives together.

All staff to be trained to a level commensurate with their duties with regard to the sale of alcohol, and will be retrained every six months. The training should be clearly documented and signed and dated by both the trainer and the member of staff receiving it. The documentation shall be available for inspection on request by an authorised officer of the Licensing Authority or a constable.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

CCTV will be provided in the form of a recordable system, capable of providing pictures of EVIDENTIAL QUALITY in all lighting conditions particularly facial recognition.

Cameras shall encompass all Ingress and egress to the premises, fire exits, outside areas, and all areas where the sale/ supply of alcohol occurs.

Equipment MUST be maintained in good working order, be correctly time and date stamped, recordings MUST be kept in date order, numbered sequentially and kept for a period of 31 days and handed to Police on demand.

The Premises Licence Holder must ensure at all times a DPS or appointed member of staff is capable and competent at downloading CCTV footage in a recordable format EITHER DISC or VHS to the Police/Local Authority on demand. The Recording equipment and tapes/discs shall be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other

The Recording equipment and tapes/discs shall be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other responsible named individual. An operational daily log report must be maintained endorsed by signature, indicating the system has been checked and is compliant, in the event of any fallings actions taken are to be recorded.

In the event of technical failure of the CCTV equipment the Premises Licence holder/DPS MUST report the failure to the Police immediately.

All Spirits to be displayed behind the counter only.

An Incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to an authorised officer of the Council or the Police. It must be completed within 24 hours of the incident and will record the following:

a)all crimes reported to the venue

b)all elections of patrons

c)any complaints received concerning crime and disorder

d)any Incidents of disorder

e)all selzures of drugs or offensive weapons

f)any faults in the CCTV system, searching equipment or scanning equipment

g)any refusal of the sale of alcohol including date, time and name of staff member

h)any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.

c) Public safety

Staff will be trained to be alert to any potential danger to customers and react accordingly. If they are unable to quickly defuse the situation without risk to customer or staff, then they are instructed to call the police. All relevant fire procedures are in place for a premise of this size.

d) The prevention of public nulsance

Customers will be reminded by way of a notice at the entrance/ exit door to please leave the premises quietly and have consideration for the neighbouring properties, sufficient litter bins will be provided to allow the customers to deposit their waste/ rubbish in the correct manner.

e) The protection of children from harm

The premises shall operate a Challenge 25 Policy. Such policy shall be written down and kept at the premises. The policy shall be produced on demand of an authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or the police or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of the Council. Prominent, clear and legible signage (in not less than 32 font bold) shall also be displayed at all entrances to the premises as well as at, at least one location behind any counter advertising the scheme operated.

A written register of refusals will be kept including a description of the people who have been unable to provide required identification to prove their age. Such records shall be kept for a period of 12 months and will be collected on a daily basis by the Designated Premises Supervisor and produced to the police or an 'authorised person' (as defined by Section 13 of the Licensing Act 2003) or an authorised Trading Standards Officer of the Council on demand.

NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- A current Blometric immigration Document (Blometric Residence Permit) Issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A current Residence Card Issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic
 Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or
 residence.
- A current ImmIgration Status Document containing a photograph Issued by the Home Office to the holder
 with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not

 reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
 decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one
 of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (II) self-employed e.g. contracts, Involces, or audited accounts with a bank,

Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined flighting sports – defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts – are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises
 of (I) a local authority, or (II) a school, or (III) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500,
 and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (I) the local
 authority concerned, or (II) the school or (III) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:

 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (I) a local authority, or (II) a school, or (III) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (I) the local authority concerned, or (II) the school proprietor or (III) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no Ilcence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audlence does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains Ilcensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audlence size for:
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided 0 by or on behalf of the local authority:
 - any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or 0 on behalf of the school proprletor; and
 - any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling 0 circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.

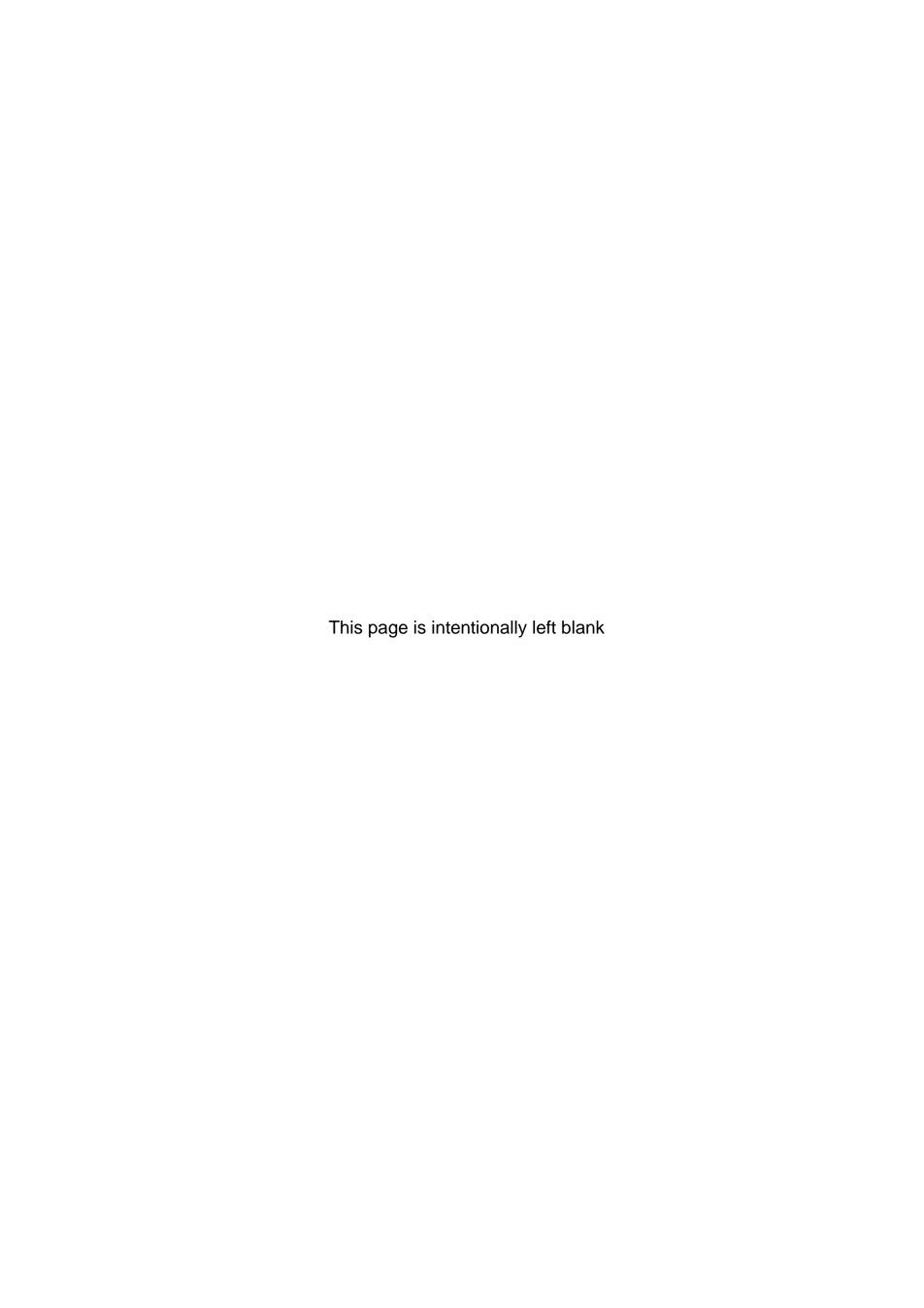

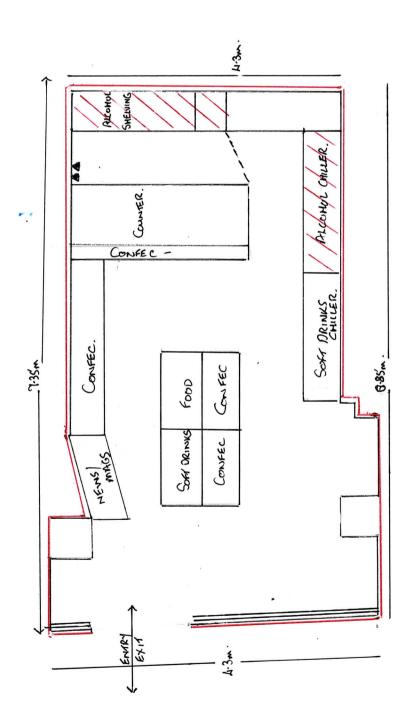

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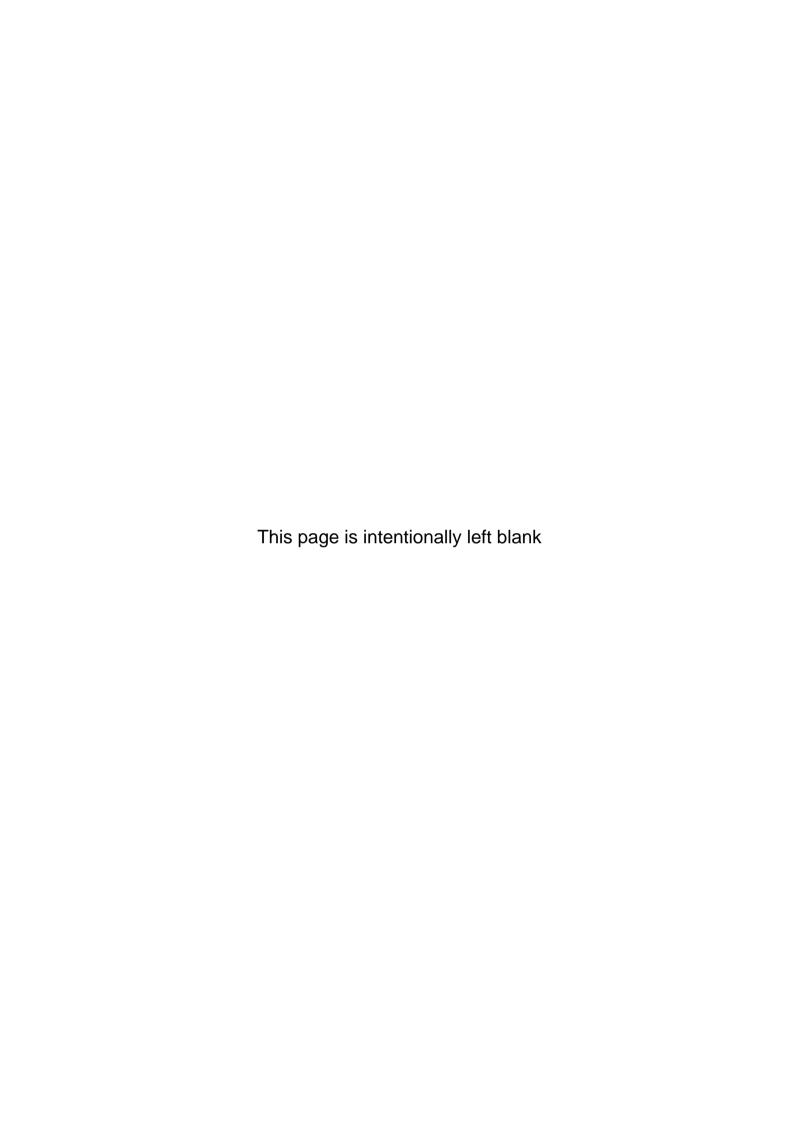

Appendix C - Conditions agreed with the Police

- 1. All alcohol to be displayed behind a secure counter (not available for self service).
- 2. Only beer, cider and lager with a maximum ABV content of 5.5% to be sold, except for specialist branded premium priced products.
- 3. A member of staff shall be on the shop floor at any time a customer is within the shop.
- 4. Audible door chime to notify a member of staff when customer enters/exits store.
- 5. There shall be no advertising of alcohol products in either the shop front windows or the exterior of the premises.
- 6. Times of when alcohol can be sold will be on display within the premises.
- 7. All staff shall be trained to record refusals of sales of alcohol in a refusals register.
- 8. All relevant staff are appropriately, and well trained about: the requirements for persons' identification; establishing age; the adopted Nationally recognised Age Restricted Policy; not serving alcohol to intoxicated persons; asking customers to use premises in an orderly and respectful manner; and adhering to Environmental Health requirements. Records of such training must be made available, on demand, to any authorised officer.
- 9. It is considered that for the nature of the operation door supervisors will not be required at all times, however a liaison system with the police licensing officer set up, whereby on certain occasions a year and where it is considered necessary a security officer/doorman will be employed by the licence holder based on a risk assessment and having regard to advice from the police.
- 10. The person nominated as the DPS will join the Cambac Nightsafe/Pub watch scheme and support its aims and objectives. This includes support of its agreed banning policy and attending meetings; personally or by sending an authorised representative of the venue. The condition is only binding whilst the Nightsafe/Pub watch scheme is in existence.

- 11. A written or electronic log will be kept of all refusals including refusals to sell alcohol. The Premises Licence holder shall ensure that refusals log is checked on a regular basis. The log will be kept and maintained at the premises and will be available at all times whilst the premises are open for inspection immediately upon request by Cambridgeshire Police and any responsible authority.
- 12. The DPS or relevant person will actively operate "Challenge 25 Policy" This will include a voluntary agreement to only accept identity cards with the "Pass" accreditation; passports; photo ID driving licences; any National identity card as ruled by any British Court as a bona-fide recognised form of identification; or any future identification card as approved by central government; as bona-fide recognised forms of identification.
- 13. No customers carrying opened bottles of alcoholic drink upon entry shall be admitted to premises at any time they are open to the public.
- 14. No single cans or bottles of beer, lager, cider to be sold.
- 15. Sales area to be no more than 10% of premises to be used for alcohol.
- 16. Till prompts shall automatically prompt staff to ask for age verification identification when presented with an alcohol sale.

<u>Appendix C – Best One Express Representation Redacted</u>

Subject: Re: Application received under the Licensing Act 2003 for a new Premises Licence – Best One Express

I would like to make an objection to this application.

The location is within the city centre cumulative impact area. I am objecting because the application does not address issues of cumulative impact, as it should do under 4.9 of the cumulative impact assessment, which indicates a lack of awareness of the authority's policy regime. It does ask for "an exception" but no reason for an exception is provided except economic need, which as far as I am aware is not a relevant factor, although I naturally have sympathy.

I am also objecting because I consider that the application, even with the conditions recommended by the Police, will leave the business ill-equipped to deliver on the licensing objectives.

I am obliged to highlight that 'cumulative' in the very local sense means next door to Waitrose, which staffs access and egress from its licensed store with a uniformed guard which helped to gain them their licence for alcohol sales. The guard role there is active in regulating access and intervening on egress from the premises. In this context, in the absence of a guard at 4 Fitzroy Street - indeed with only one staff member present and s/he not located between the open shelving for alcohol and street access, the premises will immediately be identified as the go-to place for those looking for unprotected alcohol.

In my opinion this business is unfortunately not proposing the resources necessary to address the local situation in a properly considered attempt to meet any of the licensing objectives.

The location is 50 metres from the Willow Walk hostel for the highest needs homeless people, who typically are suffering from addictions or mental ill health or both. Fitzroy Street is the regular location of beggars and rough sleepers. The confectionary merchandise of the shop itself draws children on the school run to St Mathews and Park Street Primary Schools and Parkside Community College. These are the most sensitive and at times pressurised and volatile conditions into which to introduce a further outlet for alcohol sales with lower than the prevailing standards of security.
