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**22/8/WAC Welcome, Introduction and Apologies for Absence**

There were no apologies.

**22/9/WAC Declarations of Interest**

No declarations of interest were made.

**22/10/WAC Notes of last meeting**

The notes of the meeting held on 10 March 2022 were noted by the Committee.

**22/11/WAC Policing and Safer Neighbourhoods**

Representatives from the police team, Leigh Brown and Alice Bennett presented the Neighbourhood Profile for June 2022.

A member of the public asked a question about nuisance moped delivery drivers in the city centre. Members of the committee raised issues of road safety, street begging, drug taking and large events on the central open spaces.

Following discussion on the issues raised the police noted the following areas for focus for the next period:

Anti-social behaviour on green spaces eg Jesus Green;  
Road safety focussing on delivery mopeds and scooters, particularly in the city centre and central open spaces;  
Street begging and;  
Supporting the new (police campaign) expected on drugs with focus on frequent users and the night time economy

### **22/12/WAC Cambourne to Cambridge Better Public Transport and Active Travel – Environmental Impact Assessment consultation**

The Committee received a presentation on the GCP consultation. A member of the public asked a question regarding the number of diesel buses that may use the C2C busway. The officer replied that the buses would be at least of Euro 6 standard as a minimum which are able to be used in designated Clean Air Zones (eg. as London). But it should be noted that an Environmental Impact Assessment would be undertaken as part of the statutory processes.

Discussion took place on how the junction with Grange Road and the (current access) road to the Rifle Range would work, noting a large tree would be required to be taken down. The officer noted that the current plan was for between 6-10 buses an hour.

The committee thanked the officer for the presentation.

### **22/13/WAC A New Road Classification for Cambridge (Greater Cambridge Partnership)**

The committee received a presentation from the GCP.

Members asked the following:

What would be the next steps following the consultation?

Would an equalities impact assessment be undertaken?

The officer responded by stating that the GCP would consider the responses to the consultation in December 2022 and make recommendations to the County Council early in 2023. There would then be a second round of consultation on the next steps and prioritisation for the network-overall the implementation would take many years to complete. The County Council had

taken on board lessons learnt during the closures approved during the pandemic and would ensure more significant and earlier engagement with local communities and stakeholders.

The GCP had commissioned Access for All a charity to audit the proposals, in addition to an EQIA which would be produced.

Cllr Nethsingha stated that the end result must not be that those who live on the major routes have a worse impact (to now) whilst others benefit disproportionately-and the impact assessment would be a key tool in helping to assess that.

The committee thanked the officers for the presentation.

## **22/14/WAC Open Forum**

Members of the public asked a number of questions, as set out below.

### **1. A member of the public raised the following: When will the draft South Newnham Neighbourhood Plan be reviewed by officers?**

Cllr Holloway replied that the South Newnham Neighbourhood Forum had been working on a revised draft of their neighbourhood plan after a meeting with officers in October 2019 where an earlier draft was discussed, and comments sent to them. The forum had now asked to meet with officers to discuss their latest plan. From experience with other groups preparing neighbourhood plans the officers had found it invaluable to have an opportunity to read a draft plan before such a meeting and had asked the forum to share with officers their latest draft. Officers had not yet received it but once received a meeting will be arranged to offer officer comments.

### **When will the South Newnham Neighbourhood Forum be designated?**

Cllr Holloway continued that the Council had received the application from the forum to be redesignated and were currently carrying out a six-week public consultation on the application as is required by the national regulations governing neighbourhood planning. The consultation ends on 5pm on 21 June. Following this officers would prepare a report setting out the comments received during the consultation and whether the forum should be redesignated. The decision will be made by Cllr Katie Thornburrow as the Executive Councillor for Planning and Infrastructure. The national regulations require that this decision must be made within 13 weeks of the consultation

beginning – 9 August 2022. It is anticipated that a decision would be made well before this date.

**Shouldn't large scale developments like Queens' College Owlscroft be paused until the Forum can act as statutory consultee again in order not to undermine the draft Neighbourhood Plan?**

Cllr Sweeney replied stating that a draft neighbourhood plan only begins to have weight in determining planning applications once it has been formally submitted to the Local Planning Authority. The South Newnham Plan has several stages to go before it can be submitted to Cambridge City Council. The draft Plan will have to have a Strategic Environmental Assessment and Habitats Regulation Assessment screening; a six-week public consultation will have to be carried out by the forum followed by a review of the policies in the Plan. It is only after these stages that the Plan can be submitted to Cambridge City Council along with other supporting documents. The current draft Plan would not have any weight in determining the Queen's College application. The role of the forum is to prepare a neighbourhood plan.

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# 1. Introduction

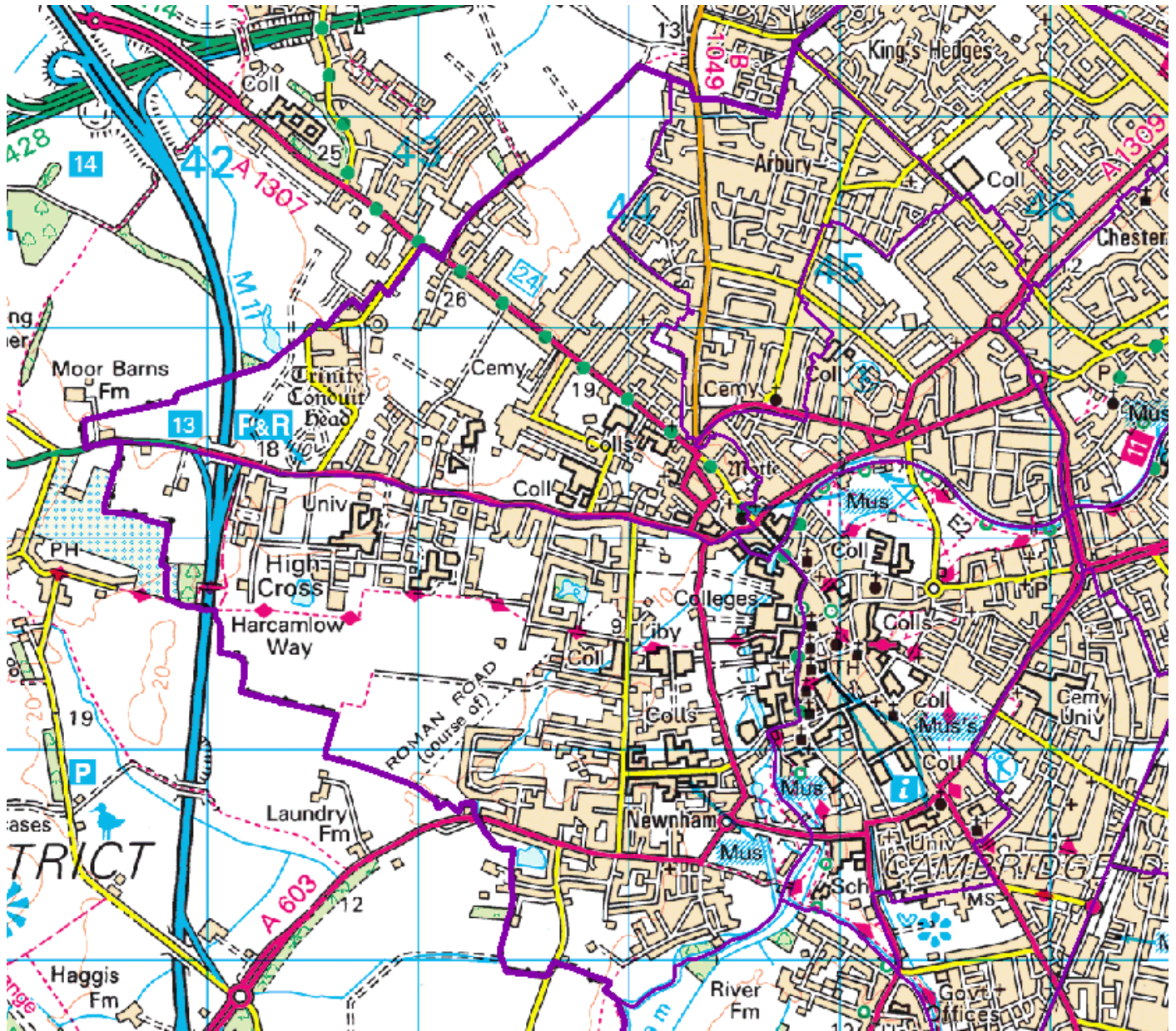
This report provides an overview of the council's Streets and Open Spaces, Environmental Health and Shared Waste service activity in the Area Committee area over the past six months.

This report provides open data on service performance, so that City and County Councillors and their constituents are informed of what service activity is happening in their area; and can engage in and help to shape this activity, including identifying specific local service requests/ issues.

1. Streets and Open Spaces Operations Team:
  - a. Street cleansing and Grounds Maintenance – cleans all residential streets and public land and maintains all grass and shrub beds across the city.
  - b. Community Engagement Team - works with Community Payback and Streets and Open Spaces volunteers to deliver community nominated improvement projects.
  - c. Enforcement Team - investigate and take action against instances of environmental crime and dog control issues in public places across the city.
2. Streets and Open Spaces Assets Development Team:
3. Streets and Open Spaces Projects Team
  - a. Projects
  - b. Parks
  - c. Trees
4. The Greater Cambridge Shared Waste Service provide rubbish and recycling collections from homes and business Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire and empties 32,000 bins each day. It is responsible for setting policy on how this should be done and educating residents and customers on how best to recycle.
5. Environmental Health:
  - a. Pest control – free treatments for rats, mice, cockroaches, bedbugs, and pharaohs ants
  - b. Private sector Housing interventions – complaints and investigations regarding condition of properties
  - c. Other public health interventions – refuse, hoarding, bonfires
  - d. Noise complaints – daytime and night-time noise complaints ,

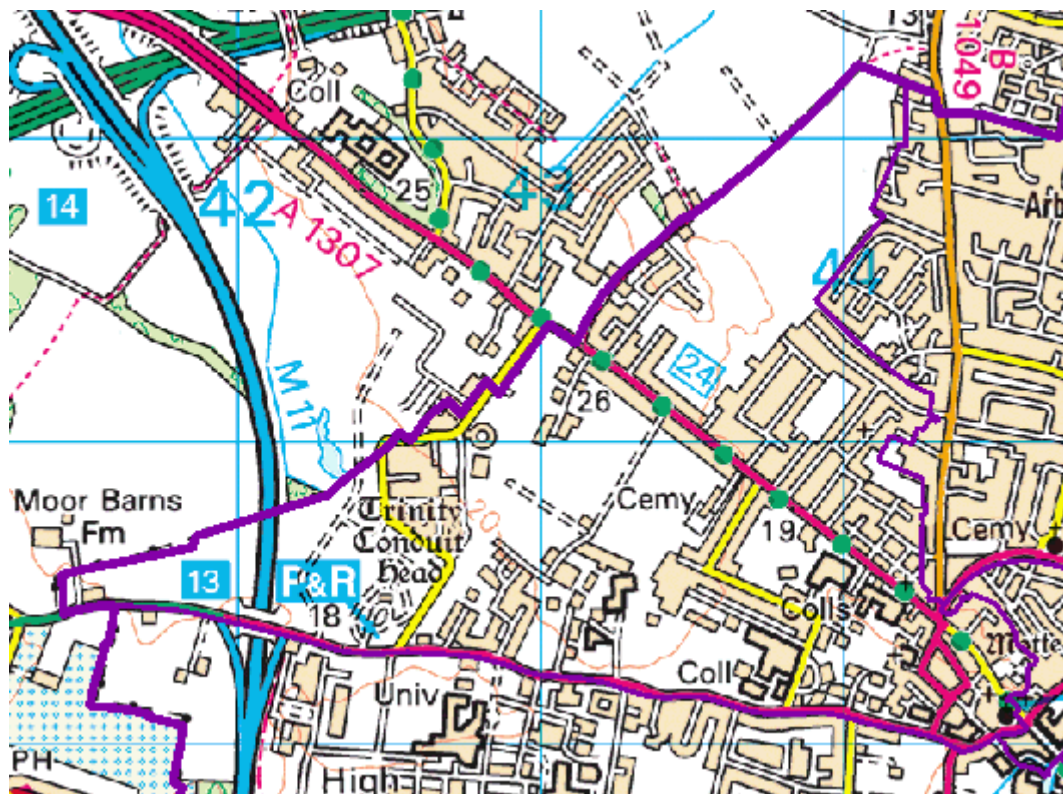

### Community Engagement team

The Community Engagement team held a Green Team at Ascension Burial Ground and undertook works to complete maintenance of the historical and biodiverse grounds to support the churches conservation award.

A 'Green Team' also helped with cutting back wildflowers at St Peter's Church.

### Enforcement team

During the period between February and July 2021 officers continued to undertake proactive and reactive patrols on the open spaces' patrols. This includes illegal campers, and littering patrols.

There was one case of littering from a motor vehicle on Castle Street where the driver was issued and paid a fixed penalty notice.



There were two cases of abandoned vehicles, one was claimed that was reported on Beagle Road and one was removed from Oxford Road and is currently in storage.

There were six cases of domestic waste offences investigated in the period one resulted in a fixed penalty notice issued for dumping cardboard at Castle Park, four cases had no suspect or officers were unable to trace and one case is ongoing.



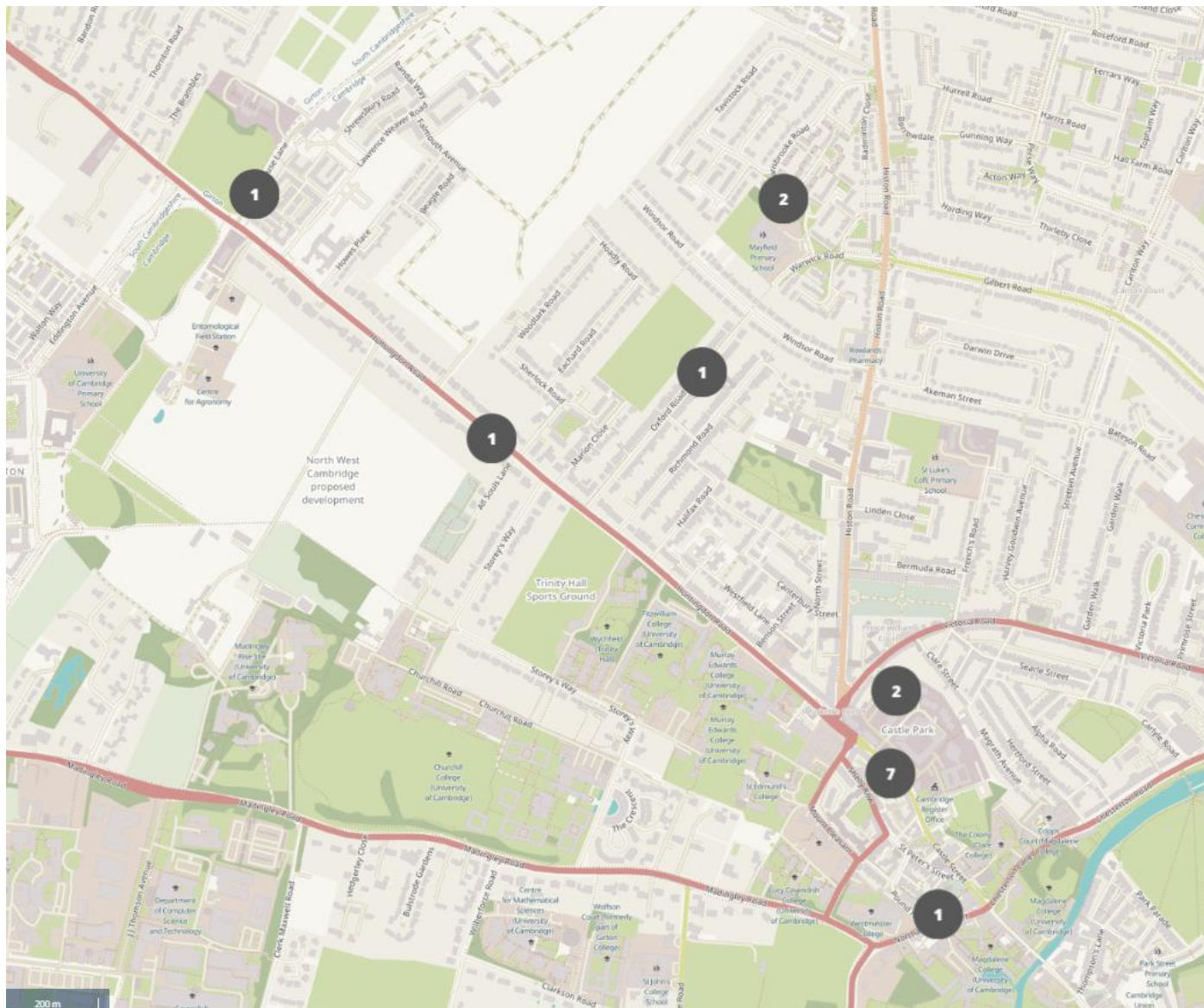

### Map



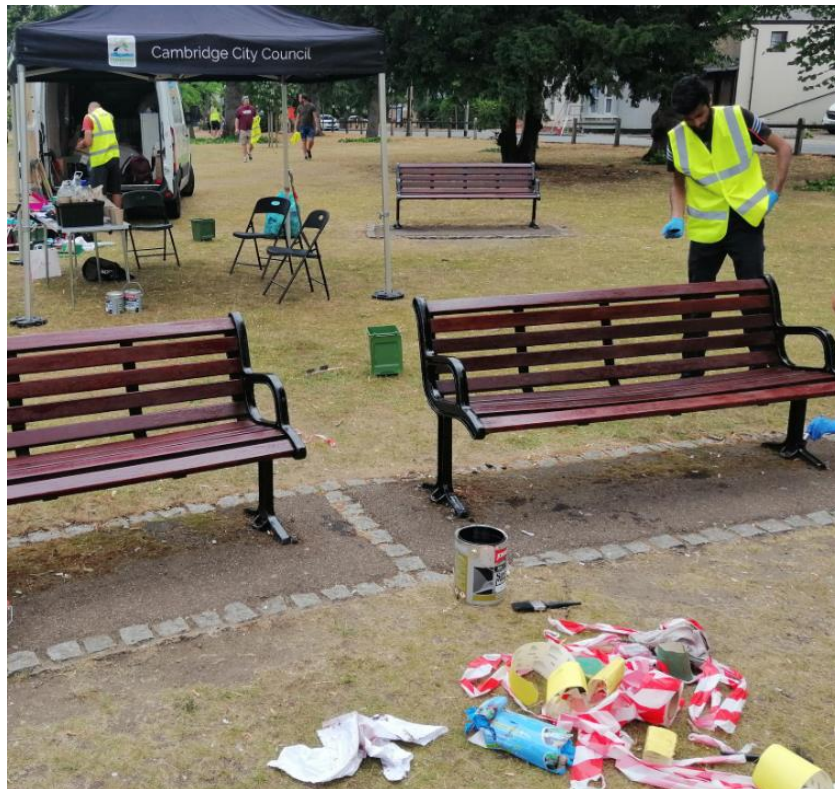
### Community Engagement team

The Community Engagement Team worked with volunteers across many works over the last months including a tree session at Parker's Piece where volunteers helped to maintain the new planted trees and added additional woodchip to the bases of the trees and placing tree gators around the trees to aid watering, a similar session was also run on Christ's Pieces. The team also ran a session at Jesus Green Lido, attended by volunteers and staff from the lido, and undertook work to maintain the newly planted hedge that replaced the felled trees. Throughout the summer months our volunteers have renovated all the benches of Jesus Green.

The team have undertaken several group litter picks on Midsummer Common and support a group of volunteers from Cambridge University to litter pick Jesus Green.

On Christ's Pieces a corporate group from AECOM completed a day of mixed activities including bench renovation, removing low level graffiti, litter picking and creating an insect habitat.





Community Payback are currently tasked to undertake works at St Clements's Church and have started work to sand and paint the railings of the church following works completed in the gardens during 2019.

### **Enforcement team**

During the period between February to July 2022 officers continued to undertake proactive litter patrols within the city, whereby fixed penalty notices were issued for littering.

Officers have dealt with some fly tipping issues within the ward from householders and businesses, whereby fixed penalty notices have been issued and all paid. Most cases were found to be at Adam and Eve Street recycling centre, other hot spot locations included Regent Street, Peas Hill, and Rose Crescent areas.

Fixed penalty notices were issued to companies for breaching section 47 notices regarding their business waste. There have also been companies issued Section 47 notices for the continually mismanaging their duty of care in relation to their trade waste. Hot spot areas for these issues included Milton's Walk and Burleigh Street area.

During the summer months, late shift patrols are being carried out on the green spaces and information regarding litter and barbecues are delivered to park users. Regular patrols were conducted throughout the area and to try and minimise litter, and rubbish bags were handed out to the general public to encourage responsible dispose of litter for picnickers. During the early mornings of the summer working pattern officers conducted dog fouling patrols across the green spaces and spoke with many dog walkers regarding the issues surrounding this

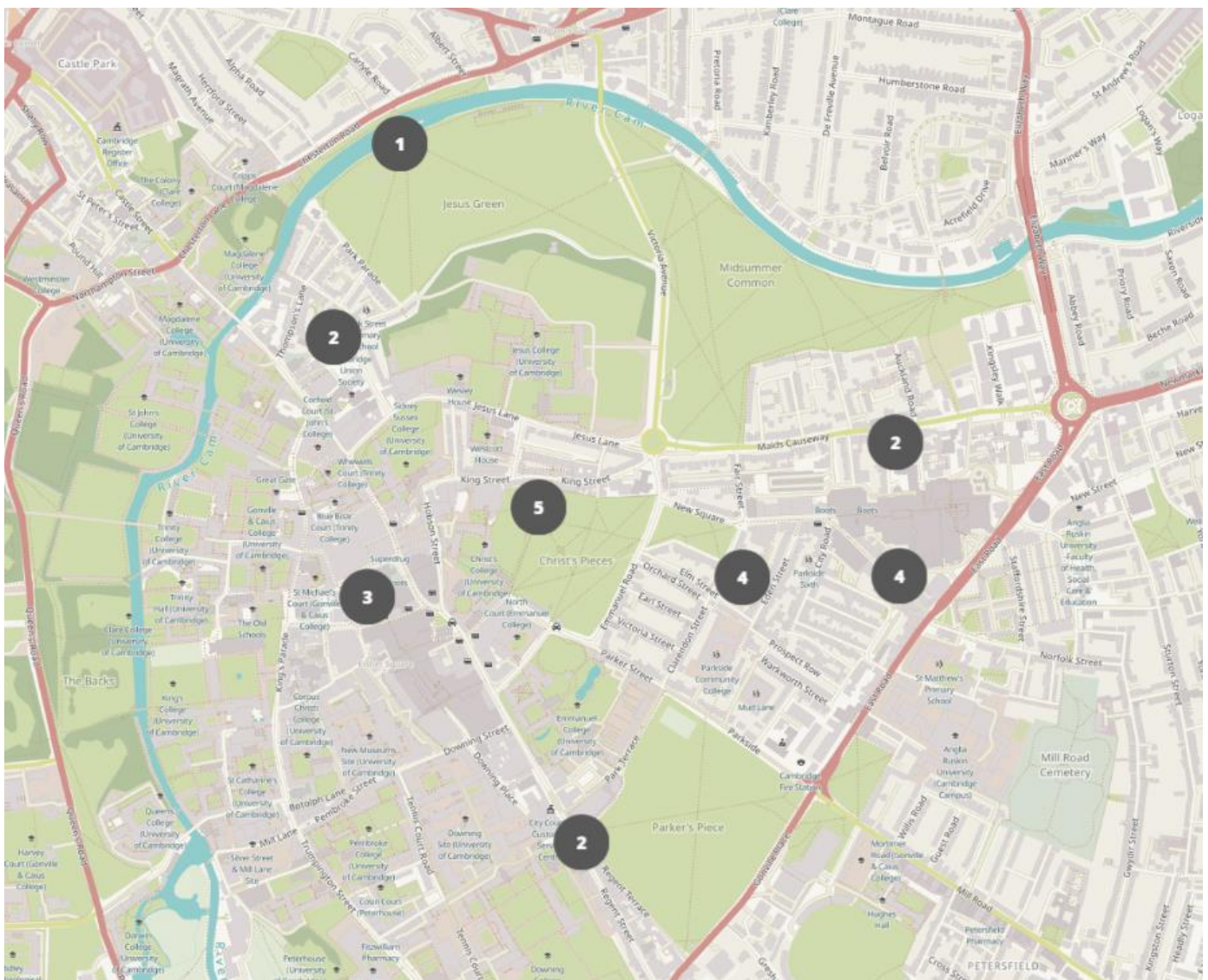
## Operations service

The Operations teams have been busy during the last few months continuing to carry out scheduled mechanical sweeping all bus routes, main roads and housing footways and carriageways. The market square is washed down on a Wednesday and Sunday mornings.

Our Grounds Maintenance operatives have been pruning, hoeing, leafing, and undertaking general preparation works to keep our city centre parks maintained.

The Rapid Response and graffiti teams are very busy dealing with graffiti tags, stickers and fly posters. The teams also wash down the pavements as part of Cambridge BID work.

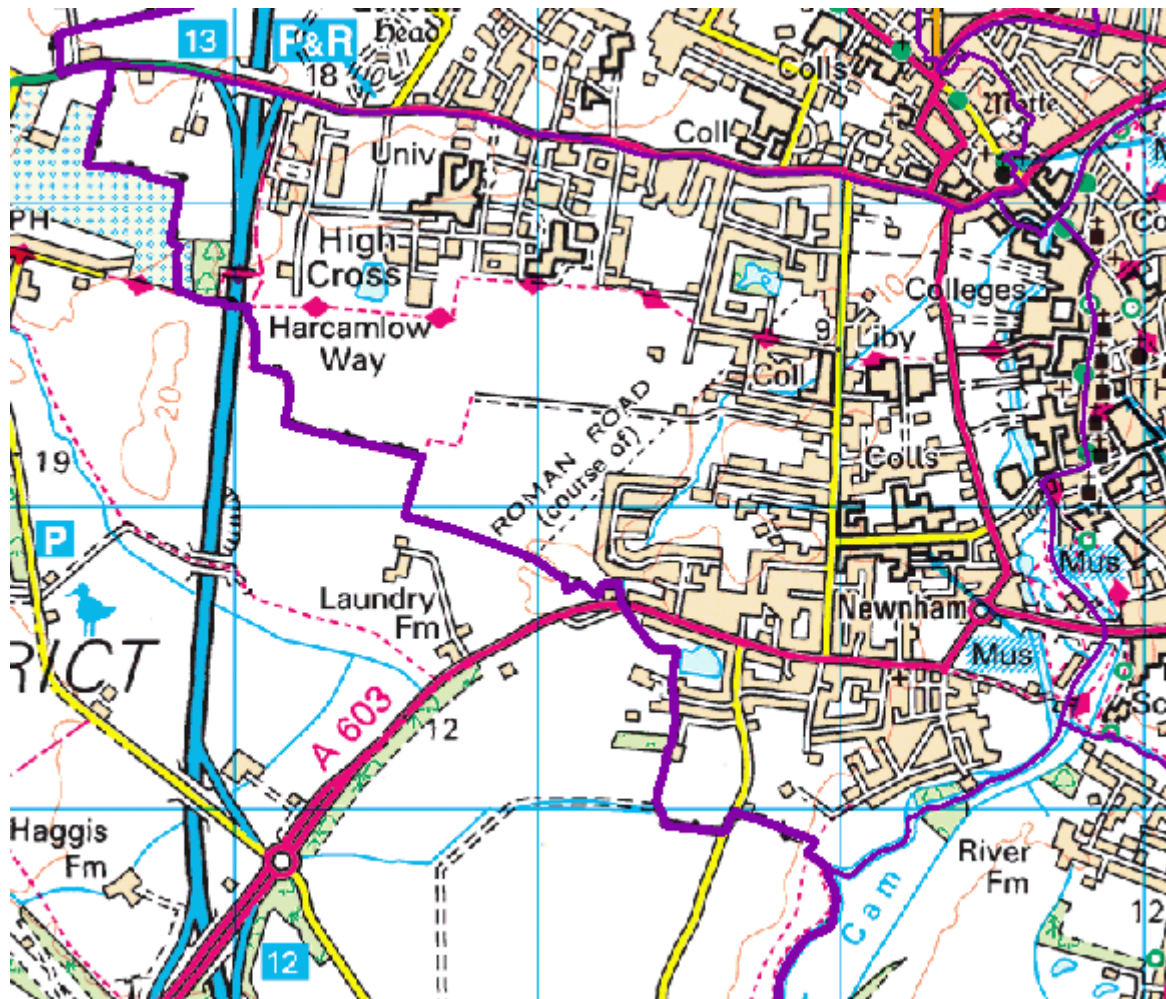

### Community Engagement team

The team have had two corporate volunteer events run in the ward over recent months, including a group on Queen's Green from Securitas who spent a day renovating some of the benches, painting railings, tree works and building an insect hotel.





At Lammas Land, the team worked with volunteers from Horizon Discovery who spent the day renovating benches, painting the toilet block, and undertaking a litter pick.

### **Enforcement team**

During the period between February and July 2022 officers continued to undertake proactive and reactive patrols on the open spaces' patrols. This includes illegal campers, and littering patrols.

There were two incidences of littering from a motor vehicle on Champneys Walk and Queens Road, both of which resulted in fixed penalty notices being issued. There was one breach of the Public Space Protection Order regarding touting on Kings Parade that resulted in a fixed penalty notice.





Two abandoned vehicles were investigated, neither of them was found to be abandoned and were claimed by the owners.

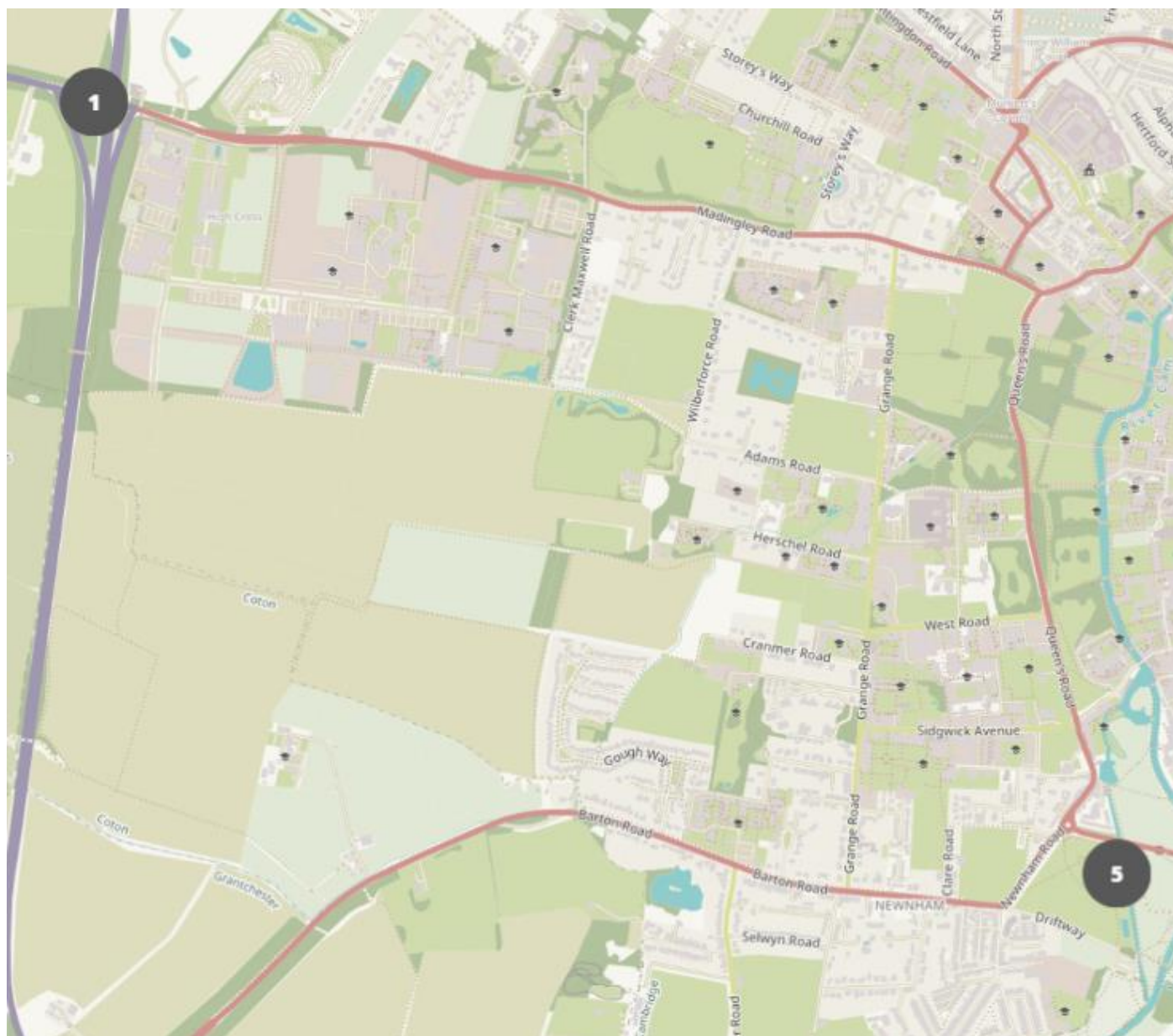
One case of domestic waste was investigated, but officers were unable to locate the offender. Three cases of commercial waste were investigated, and in two cases businesses were fined for small scale fly tipping.

##### Fly tipping:

**Needles:**

- Castle: In June one needle was removed from Richmond Road.
- Market: In March one needle was removed from Sidney Street and two needles from James Street. In June one needle was removed from Sidney Street and one needle from St Edward's Passage.
- Newnham: Twenty needles were removed from Lammas Land.

**Fixed penalty notices:**

Fixed penalty notices issued across the period includes 20 for littering, 15 for trade related waste (including littering, fly tipping and breaching of a statutory notice), 15 for domestic related waste (including littering, breach of domestic duty of care and fly tipping), 9 for littering from a motor vehicle, one for failing to clear up dog fouling and one for breach of touting public space protection order.
