## CONSIDERATION OF AN APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE TO BE GRANTED

#### INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 An application under section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 to apply for a Premises Licence with respect to The C Bar has been received from Golden Direction Property Limited. The application was served on Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) on 21 May 2025. A copy of the application was also served on each responsible authority. The application and plan are attached to the report as Appendix 1 and Appendix 1a respectively.
- 1.2 The applicant is seeking to provide the following licensable activity:
  - Supply of alcohol (Consumption on the premises)
    - Monday to Saturday 11:00 to 22:30

- 1.3 In accordance with the regulations of the Act, the application was advertised on the premises and in a local newspaper on 30 May 2025 to invite representations from responsible authorities and other persons. The last date for submitting representations was 19 June 2025.
- 1.4 Representations were received from 0 'Other Persons'.
- 1.5 Two representations were received from Responsible Authorities. One representation was received from Cambridgeshire Constabulary and is attached to this report as Appendix 2. Another representation was received from Public Health, attached to report as Appendix 3.
- 1.6 Environmental Health agreed conditions with applicant. These conditions are attached to the report as Appendix 4.
- 1.7 The application needs to be determined.

#### 2. RECOMMENDATION

2.1 That Members determine the application on its individual merits having reference to the statutory licensing objectives and Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.

#### 3. BACKGROUND

- 3.1 The premises at 1A Devonshire Road, Cambridge, CB1 2BH, was previously occupied by Cambridge Vinopolis, operating as a wine shop and bar. In 2022, the business was transferred and became Amphora Cambridge, which continued the same use. The current application proposes to operate the premises as a wine bar, as detailed in the submitted application form.
- 3.2 While the application is formally for the address at 1A Devonshire Road, which lies outside any designated Cumulative Impact Area (CIA), the submitted plans appear to also cover 112 Mill Road, CB1 2BD. These plans indicate that the entrance to the premises is positioned at the corner of Devonshire Road and Mill Road. 112 Mill Road is within a Cumulative Impact Area (CIA) and would therefore be subject to the Cumulative Impact Assessment.

- 3.3. If the licence holder intends to use 112 Mill Road for licensable activities, as shown in plans, the onus is on the applicant to demonstrate why the granting of the licence would not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced within the area.
- 3.4 In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy and additionally the statutory guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003. The relevant sections from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy are:
  - Objectives, section 2
  - Fundamental principles, section 4
  - Licensing Hours, section 6
  - Licence Conditions, section 8

#### 4. CONSULTATIONS

- 4.1 The Licensing Act 2003 requires applications made under section 17 of the Act to be served on the Responsible Authorities and also advertised on the premises and in a local newspaper circulating within the vicinity of the premises. During the consultation period, Responsible Authorities and Other Persons (any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities) may make a representation in respect of the application.
- 4.2 Statutory consultation has therefore taken place with Responsible Authorities and interested parties in accordance with the procedures set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and associated regulations made under the Act.

#### 5. OPTIONS

- 5.1 Whilst having reference to the information provided by the applicant, the information raised in the representations and also Cambridge City Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the Sub-Committee's decision must be made with a view to promoting one or more of the four licensing objectives, namely:
  - (a) the prevention of crime and disorder;
  - (b) public safety;
  - (c) the prevention of public nuisance; and

- (d) the protection of children from harm.
- 5.2 Members should take such steps that they consider are necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives. The Sub-Committee may resolve:
  - (a) to grant the licence subject to the mandatory conditions and those conditions offered by the applicant which may be modified to such extent as the authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives;
  - (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
  - (c) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor;
  - (d) to reject the application.
- 5.3 Members must give reasons for their decision.

#### 6. CONCLUSIONS

6.1 The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Licensing Act 2003 to promote the Licensing Objectives. Each objective has equal importance. In carrying out its licensing functions, the Licensing Authority must also have regard to its Statement of Licensing Policy, and the Statutory Guidance under the Licensing Act 2003, and it is bound by the Human Rights Act 1998. The Council must also fulfill its obligations under Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 to do all that it reasonably can to prevent crime and disorder in Cambridge.

#### 7. IMPLICATIONS

## (a) Financial Implications

Cambridge City Council (the Licensing Authority) has a statutory duty to determine applications made under the Licensing Act 2003. The application fees associated with such applications are set by Central Government and are intended to cover the cost of administering the licensing regime.

There are no specific financial implications associated with this report.

## (b) Staffing Implications

There are no staffing implications associated with this report.

## (c) Equal Opportunities Implications

No Equality Impact Assessment has been conducted as the only consideration in reaching a decision is whether the granting of the application will undermine the statutory licensing objectives.

## (d) Environmental Implications

Any environmental implications that need to be considered must specifically relate to the promotion of the statutory licensing objectives and will be contained in the representations made by the responsible authorities or interested parties.

## (e) Community Safety

Cambridge Constabulary, Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service, Cambridge City Council's Environmental Health Team, Cambridge City Council's Planning Service, Cambridgeshire County Council's Child Protection & Review Unit, Cambridgeshire County Council's Trading Standards Department and the Public Health Director were consulted as part of the application process and could have made representation if it was considered that the granting of the application would undermine one or more of the statutory licensing objectives.

Those making representations would have raised any relevant community safety implications.



## Police Representation - The C Bar, 1A Devonshire Road, Cambridge.

The applicant/Premises Licence Holder Mrs Yan WANG is requesting a new premises licence for The C Bar, a property at 1A Devonshire Road, Cambridge, CB1 2BH, under the Trading name of Golden Direction Property Ltd. It is described on the application form as a wine bar.

The licensable activity being requested is the on-sale supply of alcohol Monday – Saturday 11:00-22:30hrs.

Cambridgeshire Constabulary have concerns regarding the following:

- The poor quality of the application doesn't give sufficient details to allow Responsible Authorities to make an informed decision.
- There is a question as to whether this premises falls within the Mill Road Cumulative Impact Area (CIA) as the plan drawing shows a door exiting out onto the corner of Mill Road/Devonshire Road. The business that used to occupy that part of the building was Elitian Ltd, with an address of 112 Mill Rd, CB1 2BD.

Therefore, Cambridgeshire Constabulary object to this application under the licensing objectives, namely:

- Prevention of crime and disorder,
- Public Safety,
- Prevention of public nuisance.

A summary of the main concerns with the application are as follows:

- The plan drawing submitted with the application doesn't delineate what areas of the building are to be licensed.
- There is a question as to what the premises will be used for as the description of the
  premises on the application is 'The Premises is a wine bar'. However, from the plan
  drawing, the proposed basement annotates a Spa room, sauna, steam room and
  massage room. The ground floor shows three rooms as restaurants, first floor/second
  floor and loft all show hotel rooms.
- If the premises or part of, is classed as being within the CIA, the applicant has not referred to the Cumulative Impact Policy, nor evidenced how the premises would not add to the 'cumulative impact' on the local area.
- A poorly produced application demonstrates a lack of awareness, responsibility & accountability on behalf of the applicant.

During the consultation period Cambridgeshire Constabulary licensing department liaised with Alex Beebe (Licensing Officer Cambridge City Council) and discussed the concerns relating to the application. On 6th June 2025 Alex Beebe emailed the applicant with questions concerning the application requesting a response. To date no reply has been received.

Due to the applicant not providing comprehensive evidence on the application, nor replying to the request for further information, an informed decision cannot be made. Therefore, Cambridgeshire Constabulary request this application should be refused. If the applicant wishes to resubmit, it needs to be much more detailed, acknowledging the proximity of the premises to the Mill Road CIA, and evidencing the mitigating measures by way of conditions thus ensuring the premises does not add to the cumulative impact on the local area.



## Licensing Act 2003

## Licensing Act 2003 – Responsible Authority Representation

## Name and address of premises for which the representation is being made:

The C Bar, 112 Mill Road and 1a Devonshire Road, Cambridge.

Cambridgeshire Council as a responsible authority is making a representation on all four licensing objectives:

- The prevention of crime and disorder
- Public safety
- The prevention of public nuisance
- The protection of children from harm

Cambridge City Licensing Authority has published a Cumulative Impact Assessment, dated March 2024. At paragraph 3.1 it states that "Cumulative impact is the potential impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives of a significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area e.g. the potential impact on crime and disorder or public nuisance".

Notwithstanding, at paragraph 3.4 it states that "the absence of a Cumulative Impact Assessment does not prevent any responsible authority or other person making representations on a new application for the grant or variation of a licence on the grounds that the premises will give rise to a detrimental cumulative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives in a particular area".

At paragraph 4.1, it confirms that the Licensing Authority has published a Cumulative Impact Assessment in relation to specific areas of the City, which includes the entire length of Mill Road, Cambridge (excluding Brookfields).

The premises has its main entrance off Mill Road and subsidiary entrance off Devonshire Road. It is considered therefore that the premises falls within the Mill Road Cumulative Impact Area/Zone (CIZ). Mill Road is located within the Petersfield Ward for Cambridge City. According to Appendix 4 of the Cumulative Impact Assessment, dated March 2024, Petersfield Ward has 79 licensed premises.

Paragraph 4.9 of the Cumulative Impact Assessment document states "An applicant wishing to obtain a new licence or vary a licence for premises, within the cumulative impact area, will be expected to demonstrate through the operating schedule, the steps that they intend to



take so that the Council and responsible authorities can be satisfied that granting a new or varied licence will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced". Paragraph 4.10 of the same document states "The onus is on the applicant to demonstrate to the responsible authorities the suitability of how their proposal will not add to the cumulative impact".

In our opinion the applicant has not demonstrated under any of the licensing objectives how their establishment will not add to the cumulative impact in the Mill Road CIZ.

## The prevention of crime and disorder

This premise sits within a cumulative impact zone. Nationally we are aware:

- 42% of violent offenders are believed to be under the influence of alcohol (source <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit">https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit</a>, published 20 July 2023), rising to 64% in incidents of "stranger" violence (source <a href="Violent Crime and Sexual Offences Alcohol-Related Violence Office for National Statistics">Violence Office for National Statistics</a>).
- 40% of secondary school-age children have been involved in some form of violence because of alcohol (source <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit">https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit</a>, published 20 July 2023)
- 39% of sexual assaults are estimated to have taken place when the offender has been under the influence of alcohol, and 39% when the victim has been drinking (source Alcohol, sexual assault and harassment | Drinkaware).

### Locally:

 Alcohol related crimes in the Petersfield Ward, which includes Mill Road, shows that there were 69 incidents recorded between April 2022 and March 2023 (source Appendix 4 of the Cambridge City Cumulative Impact Assessment, dated 2024).

The applicant has submitted an application form and plans of the premises but has not provided any detailed actions in regard to upholding this licensing objective, other than stating that there will be 'strict security'. Public Health consider that the applicant has not provided robust evidence to demonstrate the suitability of their proposal and how it will not add to the cumulative impact already experienced in the area.

#### Recommendations

- For the applicant to implement a Refusal register.
- For the applicant to implement an incident book.
- Training for staff to be aware and look out for vulnerable people and implement 'Ask Angela' scheme.

#### Public safety

This premise sits within a cumulative impact zone and we know nationally:

 42% of violent offenders are believed to be under the influence of alcohol (source <a href="https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit">https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/police-led-alcohol-intervention-checklist-and-toolkit</a>, published 20 July 2023), rising to 64% in incidents of "stranger" violence (source Violent Crime and Sexual Offences - Alcohol-Related Violence - Office for National Statistics).

Locally



 Alcohol related incidents in the Petersfield Ward, which includes Mill Road, shows that there were 77 incidents recorded between April 2022 and March 2023 (source Appendix 4 of the Cambridge City Cumulative Impact Assessment, dated 2024).

The applicant has submitted an application form and plans of the premises but has not provided any detailed actions about upholding this licensing objective, other than stating that there will be a 'security team in place'. Public Health consider that the applicant has not provided robust evidence to demonstrate the suitability of their proposal and how it will not add to the cumulative impact already experienced in the area.

#### Recommendations

- For the applicant to consider the use of CCTV in and around the premises.
- Ensuring appropriate limits on the maximum capacity of the premises.
- Ensuring fire safety procedures are in place.
- Ensuring appropriate access for emergency services such as ambulances.
- Ensuring appropriate and frequent waste disposal, particularly of glass bottles and glasses.
- Ensuring the safety of people when leaving the premises e.g. provision of late-night transportation, clear display of taxi firms operating in the area.

## The prevention of public nuisance

The public health team is concerned about the impact of alcohol misuse and the public nuisance it causes. Other public nuisance concerns relating to noise pollution, odours and litter, and light pollution can be conditioned and regulated under other legislative regimes.

The applicant, on the submitted form, has not provided any detailed actions about upholding this licensing objective, other than stating that 'with the help of professional security team'. Public Health consider that the applicant has not provided robust evidence to demonstrate the suitability of their proposal and how it will not add to the cumulative impact already experienced in the area.

#### Recommendations

 The licensee promotes responsible drinking practices and discourages binge drinking e.g. sensible pricing policy.

#### The protection of children from harm

The applicant has submitted an application form and plans of the premises but has not provided any detailed actions about upholding this licensing objective, other than stating that there will be a 'no one under the age of 18 allowed into the premises without parents.'

It is recognised that the applicant has attempted to address the licensing objective around prevention of children from harm. However, the legal position in regard to the proposals the applicant has put forward is.

 All venues wishing to sell or are selling alcohol will have to be signed up to the Challenge 25 proof of age scheme or similar scheme.

Public Health consider that the applicant has not provided robust evidence to demonstrate the suitability of their proposal and how it will not add to the cumulative impact already experienced in the area.



#### Recommendations

- That the premises licence holder ensures that there are no specific promotions targeting alcohol products at young people e.g. alco-pops drinks or very cheap alcohol sales.
- Refusal register.
- There will be an unimpeded view of the street from the service counter/ till area as to prevent proxy sales.

### Summary

The role of public health is to promote the health and wellbeing of the local populations we serve and has close affiliation with the licensing objectives. The licensing regime is concerned with the promotion of the licensing objectives, which seek to protect the quality of life for those who live and work in the vicinity of licensed premises. We welcome Cambridge City Council's use of a "cumulative impact zone" in Mill Road.

We consider licensing legislation to be an important contributor to reducing harm by restricting availability of alcohol and safeguarding the public, including the young and vulnerable. We therefore as a first option oppose this license application in the Cumulative Impact Assessment area. The opening of an additional Licenced Premise has the potential to make it more challenging to achieve the objectives in this policy. The Cambridge City Cumulative Impact Assessment contains a rebuttal presumption that applications will normally be refused if appropriate representations are made. This Public Health representation argues the The C Bar, 112 Mill Road/1a Devonshire Road, Cambridge lacks material evidence to rebut the CIZ presumption.
