Changes in policies, and removal of charges, agreed by Members will need to be communicated to residents in due course. This will involve Customer Services, Media and Communications partners in both councils.

7. Potential impact

Aggregation of performance reporting by Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire DC – this is a positive move forward to protect the performance and financial interests of the councils and taxpayers.

Increasing opportunities to recycle, including a policy to permit reasonable side recycling – this is a positive policy as it allows all residents to recycle more without the need to secure a second recycling bin for occasional small amounts of recycling when needed.

Removal of charges in a number of areas relating to the purchase of black bins, and replacement of stolen bins – this is a positive change for residents as the need to pay for black bins (stolen or damaged) is regularised to be the same as it is for blue (recycling) and green (garden) waste bins.

No specific issues relating to age, save to say that removal of specified charges, and increasing recycling opportunities, is positive for all.

Impacts of providing opportunities to set-out side recycling are likely to be positive for householders receiving 'assisted collections'. This will be examined in further detail in the period leading up to (and after) implementation of the revised policy. The policy already operates successfully in South Cambs DC's area.
