Background

The entire length of Mill Road is located within one of Cambridge City Council's Cumulative Impact Zones (CIZ). (Appendix 1 – shows the Petersfield section of CIZ). It is divided between Petersfield and Romsey Wards, with them being physically separated by a railway line, connected by a road/pedestrian bridge. Mill Road is a major thoroughfare for pedestrians going to and leaving the city centre area at all times of the day and early hours of the morning.

Cambridgeshire Constabulary Licensing Department was approached by Richard Arnot (Partner - Ward Hadaway Solicitors) for pre-application advice. As per the request, the police provided such advice to him. The majority of the recommended conditions, that would help reduce the negative affect on the CIZ have been included in the operating schedule of the application. As part of the pre-application advice I also stated to Mr Arnot that even if all these recommended conditions were included in the application, I was still minded to submit a representation against this application. Due to the fact that Mill Road is an area sensitive to alcohol related issues, and I did not believe the addition of another off-licence outlet on Mill Road would be conducive to Cambridge City Council's Cumulative Impact policy.

Issues associated with area

The problems associated with the area particularly in relation to alcohol related anti-social behaviour and crime, alcohol misuse and public nuisance are well documented. The area continues to attract groups of individuals who live a street life existence. These vulnerable adults, with drink and drug problems lead a chaotic life style. They would no doubt be susceptible to the draw of an additional alcohol outlet. Historically, these people have presented significant challenges at all times of the day to shop staff and other customers by being intimidating and, often ready to offer violence/aggression when challenged or refused service. The condition to deploy a SIA (Security Industry Authority) registered security guard during the hours when alcohol is permitted to be sold, should reduce the problems directed towards shop staff, however this would very much depend on the competency of each individual SIA guard. Additionally, their presence should reduce the risk of alcohol theft, however, this risk would not be negated altogether as it is intended that alcohol products are available for self-service.

Another helpful measure offered by the applicant is the reduced 'Supply of Alcohol' hours (between 11:00-20:00hrs), which would reduce the historical issues associated with people wishing to purchase alcohol in order to 'pre-load' whilst on-route to city centre for an evening/night out. Apart from those who may wish to do so prior to 20:00hrs.

Currently there are a total of ~44 Licensed Premises on Mill Road, made up of on-licences, off-licences and both. 26 (59%) of these premises are along the Petersfield section of Mill Road. This figure represents 42% of the 61 licensed premises in Petersfield Ward. Another general off-licence permitting sale and consumption of alcohol off the premises is not only an unnecessary addition to Mill Road and Petersfield Ward, but also unhelpful in such an alcohol sensitive area. Merely adding to the cumulate impact on the residents and other users.

The CIZ was only last reviewed in January 2021, resulting in Cambridge City Council readopting the existing CIZ's, with the addition of a further area in the north of the city. (Appendix 2 – Cambridgeshire Constabulary Cumulative Impact Zone Report 2020)

Alcohol related incidents

More recent detailed figures show that between 1st March 2019 – 1st March 2020 the police recorded 26 'street based' incidents along the Petersfield section of Mill Road, which were marked as involving alcohol. Though it should be noted that these incidents are dependent upon having been tagged with an 'alcohol marker' which is not reliably the case. Also, please note that these are only incidents reported to the police, and do not include recorded crimes that may have been recorded directly onto the crime recording database rather then being created as an incident.

The vast majority of these incidents refer to: street drinkers being abusive to members of the public, concerns for the safety of people 'passed out' on the path, or persons walking in the road, presenting

a danger to themselves and other road users. Additionally, a number of calls to assist ambulance staff who are trying to assess/treat uncooperative, vulnerable persons who are under the influence of alcohol/drugs. (Appendix 3 – Table of alcohol related incidents report to police between 1st March 2019 – 1st March 2020).

Effect of Coronavirus pandemic on police incident/crime reports

The last year or so have been unprecedented times, with the Coronavirus global pandemic taking hold. To date, this has resulted in three National Lockdowns and regional tiers being introduced around the country. These measures restricted the ability of many businesses to open, and altered people's day to day movements. To this end, the demands on policing over this period have also altered, resulting in the change to the types of incidents reported and recorded crime trends. Due to this there would be no benefit in police providing more up to date data, past 1st March 2020. There is no reason to believe that once the economy fully reopens and the nation gets back to 'normality' that there will be any significant change to the pre-pandemic crime/incident levels.

Additional preventative measure - PSPO

The existence of Cambridge City Councils' Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO), which is valid until 31st May 2022, reaffirms the belief that the local area still suffers from alcohol related anti-social behaviour and crime, which has a significant impact on the lives of residents and other locals.

The areas covered by the PSPO are: Petersfield Green (locally known as Donkey Common), Mill Road Cemetery and the front garden to Ditchburn Place. The PSPO prohibits a person from consuming alcohol or having an open container of alcohol in their possession. Unfortunately, the location of this Co-op store is literally situated directly opposite the entrance to Mill Road Cemetery. (As shown in Appendix 4).

Question

I would like to seek clarification, as to whether the applicant intended to include the condition:

 All spirits are to be displayed behind a secure checkout area to which the public do not have access (so not available for self service).

The reason for the question is that the annotation on plan drawing (submitted alongside the application) appears to suggest this?

Summary

Despite the inclusion of conditions and other measures, volunteered by the applicant, (which will undoubtably reduce the impact of the licensed premises), it is still true to say that it is hard to believe how any degree of control can be exercised by the premises over its customers that effectively walk away with the alcohol.

Once having left the premises they are at liberty to do whatever they wish, without any possible intervention from the licensee to negate the risk of adding to the cumulative impact.

The special policy relating to cumulative impact zones within the city, creates a rebuttable presumption that applications which are likely to add to the existing cumulative impact will normally be refused, if relevant representations are received about the cumulative impact on the licensing objectives. Unless the applicant can demonstrate why the operation of the premises involved will not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced.

Though the applicant has included some robust conditions and reduced 'Supply of Alcohol' hours, the police do not believe that the application submitted addresses the rebuttable presumption sufficiently for the premises licence to be granted. Therefore, we object against this application for an off-licence, and I feel it is entirely appropriate that this decision is made by the Licensing Sub-Committee members.

If the committee were minded to grant the licence, the police would recommend the additional conditions listed in Appendix 5 in an attempt to further reduce the impact on the local area. Particularly, condition 1 - All alcohol to be displayed behind a secure checkout area to which the public do not have access.

One other off-licence (in the city centre CIZ) is subjected to a similar worded condition.

This requirement will make the premises far less attract to those people inclined to steal alcohol, and more importantly will provide the staff with another 'line of defence' to prevent selling alcohol to intoxicated customers. As this arrangement would require a verbal interaction between all customers purchasing alcohol and the serving staff, thus giving the staff member verbal and non-verb indicators that the customer may be intoxicated, reinforcing their justification to refusal of sale.

Evidence presented in support of this representation may comprise of, although not exclusively, firsthand knowledge of the local neighbourhood sergeant for Cambridge East, and statistical analysis of alcohol related incidents.



Three years data has been analysed, though it should be noted that we are dependent upon crimes and incidents having an 'alcohol' marker which is not reliably the case. Additionally, in May 2018 Cambridgeshire Constabulary converted to a new Crime recording system, which again required an 'alcohol' qualifier to be recorded against a crime for it to be included in these statistics. These figures relate to all alcohol related crimes and incidents recorded within the Cambridge Ward areas that have been identified using the recording systems – 'Crime File', 'Command & Control 3' and 'Athena'.

From the information that is recorded below, it can be seen that in Cambridge there is a general correlation between the ward areas with the highest number of licenced premises and the number of alcohol related crime and incidents.

There has been an overall ~12% decrease in the number of alcohol related crimes and incidents recorded in Cambridge between April 2017-March 2018, and April 2019-March 2020.

The table below shows the highest 15 streets in Cambridge for reports of alcohol related crimes and incidents between April 2017 – May 2020. Ten of these streets being located within the existing City Centre Cumulative Impact Zone (CIZ). Hills Road and Mill Road also located in existing CIZs.

MARKET WARD

The main hot spot areas for alcohol related crime and incidents in Market Ward, are focused on St. Andrews Street, Sidney Street, Downing Street and Regent Street. With St. Andrews Street accounting for 14% of all the alcohol related crime and incidents in Market Ward. Sidney Street, Downing Street and Regent Street all account for approximately ~7% respectively. This shows a continued requirement for the presence of the current city centre CIZ.

COLERIDGE

Coleridge Ward has seen a small reduction of ~7% in the overall alcohol related crime and incidents from the period March 2014- February 2017 to March 2017- February 2020. However, over the same period the percentage of these crimes and incidents occurring on the Cambridge Leisure Park has seen a significant reduced from 30% to only ~9%, indicating that the presence of the current CIZ has been effective.

PETERSFIELD/ROMSEY

Despite the combined figures for these two wards showing a ~5% reduction in the overall alcohol related crime and incidents from the period March 2014- February 2017 to March 2017- February 2020. There are still two 'hotspot' areas, namely; Mill Road and Hills Road.

Mill Road:

- A total of 232 (~22%) of all recorded alcohol related incidents and crimes in Petersfield and Romsey Wards occurs on Mill Road.
- There is a total of 44 Licensed Premises on Mill Road, made up of premises with onlicences, off-licences and both.
- Between 1st March 2019 29th February 2020 the police recorded 26 'street based' alcohol related incidents (not crimes) along the Petersfield section of Mill Road. The vast majority of these incidents refer to: street drinkers being abusive to members of the public, concerns for the safety of people 'passed out' on the path, or persons

walking in the road, presenting a danger to themselves and other road users. Additionally, a number of calls to assist ambulance staff who are trying to assess/treat uncooperative, vulnerable persons who are under the influence of alcohol/drugs.

PETERSFIELD AND TRUMPINGTON

Hills Road:

- Over the 3-year period a total of 215 (~12%) of all alcohol related crimes and incidents within the Wards of Petersfield, Coleridge and Trumpington were recorded along Hills Road, not including those recorded as occurring at Addenbrookes hospital, Hills Road.
- The vast majority of these records indicate that the offending party was intoxicated, resulting in violent behaviour, with some leading to an assault, or displaying aggressive behaviour in a public place.

It is evident from the general downward trend in alcohol related crime and incidents that current CIZs are effective and are having a positive impact. However, the previously identified hotspots for these types of crimes and incidents continue to be problematic areas in Cambridge City, and therefore it is recommended that the current Cumulative Impact Zones remain in place.

WEST CHESTERTON

It should be noted that over the last 3 years the statistics show that Chesterton Road is a hotspot area for alcohol related crimes and incidents.

There is a small section of Chesterton Road within Arbury Ward, but its majority is in West Chesterton Ward. Chesterton Road features 4th in the table for the highest alcohol related crimes and incidents which is concerning as it isn't located within any of the existing CIZ. The city centre CIZ borders the southern bank of the River Cam, and Chesterton Road is located just north of the river.

As a comparison with Mill Road, between 1st March 2019 – 29th February 2020 the police recorded 21 'street based' alcohol related incidents (not crimes) along Chesterton Road.

The vast majority of this incidents refer to incidents involving street drinkers being abusive to members of the public and shop staff, begging, fighting amongst themselves. Additionally, as with Mill Road we have recorded a number of calls to assist ambulance staff who are trying to assess and treat unwilling, vulnerable people who are under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

The majority of these reports are centred around the 'Mitcham's Corner' area, and roads leading off it. The areas include; the parade of shops and businesses on Milton Road (as far as Springfield Terrace), the section of Chesterton Road from Croft Holme Lane, along to Ferry Path, and the section of Victoria Avenue, north of the River Cam.

There appears to be disproportionally high level of alcohol related crimes and incidents in this area of the West Chesterton ward, considering it only has 14 licensed premises. However, a high percentage of these premises are located within this 'hot spot' area. ~23%

of all recorded alcohol related crimes and incidents occur along Chesterton Road. Therefore, consideration should be given to extending the city centre CIZ to include this area, or to create a new CIZ for this relatively small geographical area.
